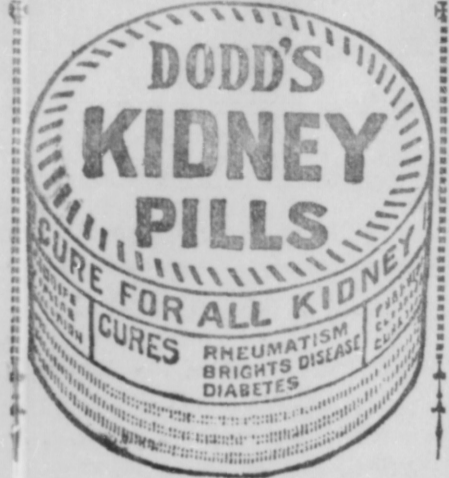

A By-Law for Levying and Specifying the Rate of Assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property and Poll in the City of Charlottetown for a Waterworks Fund, under Statute 50th Victoria, Chapter 8.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. The rate of Assessment on Real Estate for a Waterworks Fund under said Statute for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the general Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City, and all persons liable to pay Poll Tax therein made and duly returned by them on the twenty-third day of March, A. D. 1899.

2nd. The rate of Assessment on Personal Property for such Water Works Fund for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them as aforesaid.

3rd. The amount of Poll Tax to be paid by every person returned by the said Assessors in said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll as liable thereto for such Water Works Fund under said Statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the sum of Ten Cents (10c) on the poll of every person so assessed and returned as aforesaid.

A By-law for allowing a Rate of Discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general civic purposes for the current year ending the thirty-first day of December A. D. 1899.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. A discount at the rate of Two and One-half Per Cent shall be allowed to all taxpayers who shall, on or before the Fifteenth day of July next, A. D. 1899, pay to the City Clerk, at his office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate and Personal Property for civic purposes.

A By-law for levying and specifying the rate of assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general civic purposes under Statute 51 Victoria, Chapter 12.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. The rate of assessment on Real Estate for general civic purposes under said Statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City, and of all persons liable to pay Poll Tax therein, made and duly returned by them on the twenty-third day of March, A. D. 1899.

2nd. The rate of assessment on Personal Property for such general civic purposes, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of seven-eighths of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them as aforesaid.

BRITISH CAPITAL GOING TO EGYPT.

Lord Cromer Reports Another Prosperous Year.

CAIRO, April 10.—Lord Cromer, the British Minister, in his annual report on the finances and conditions of Egypt and the Soudan, says that Egypt has had another year of prosperity, the surplus for 1898 amounting to £484,000 Egyptian. He remarks upon the growing disposition to invest British capital in the country. The deficit in the finances of the Soudan is placed at £200,000 Egyptian.

Dealing with the development of the Soudan, Lord Cromer refers to the contract for the Atbara bridge, the placing of which with an American firm caused much comment. He says that an English firm offered to deliver the bridge in six months and a half at a cost of £10,490, while the American firm undertook to deliver it in 42 days at a cost of £6,500. The latter offer was therefore accepted. Lord Cromer adds:—

"The time of delivery was an even more important consideration than the price. I have no doubt these facts will admit of some explanation wherewith I am unacquainted. They appear however to merit the attention of bridge builders in Great Britain.

Lord Cromer says he hopes that the railway will reach Khartoum at the end of 1899, and be extended to Abu Haraz in 1900. Thence it will be constructed eventually to Gedaref, Kassala, and the Red Sea, but the route has not yet been decided upon.

RICH STRIKES ON THE YUKON.

\$1,800 in Coarse Gold Reported Taken Out by Six Men in Six Days.

OTTAWA, April 10.—Mr. John J. Healy, president of the North American Trading and Transportation Company, who is here has lately received letters telling of a rich strike on the Yukon. Mr. Healy refuses to tell the location. Six men, he says, took out \$1,800 in coarse gold in six days. Mr. Healy states that his friend says the district will be one of the most valuable in the North.

Advices from other points, he says, also state that many new gold creeks will be opened and that they are expected to prove very rich.

THE NOTION IS ABSURD.

Proposal to Exchange West Indies for Philippines Launched at.

LONDON, April 10.—The Globe refers to the absurd notion of the American papers that England might exchange her possessions in the West Indies for the Philippines. The paper says that such an exchange for England would amount to giving the desirable for the undesirable. The British West Indies, it asserts, have not the slightest wish to change their sovereignty. The petitions which the colonists there have sent to the British Government have references only to the securing of fresh concessions from England. The Globe adduces as an argument for England's retention of the West Indies the expected opening of the Nicaraguan canal.

TO CREATE MANY CARDINALS.

Pope Will Do So on the Occasion of His Jubilee.

LONDON, Saturday, April, 10.—The Rome correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says: "The Pope is extremely anxious to stop the rumor that his health is failing, and is resolved to appear in the thanksgiving service in St. Peter's cathedral on the 16th. He adds, further, that he will hold a consistory next month, when he would announce that on the occasion of his jubilee next year he will create a dozen cardinals."

RSTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Montreal Gazette: The iniquity of those who prolong parliamentary debates is being duly denounced in the Liberal press. There is a change in the writers' sentiments since 1896, when Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues were held to be exhibiting the highest form of statesmanship when they kept the House of Commons sitting, night and day, for week after week, while they strove by long speeches to prevent the passage of a bill to restore to the Roman Catholics of Manitoba their separate schools.

Mail and Empire: Mr. Sifton seems to have entered the Interior Department thinking that he had acquired the gold mining regions of Canada, and that he was entitled to create them for his friends. On this basis the creeks were divided up among the faithful, the placer mines were allotted in part to the political officials, and the quartz mining franchise was designated for the railway contractors.

NEWS NOTES.

The United States is ascertaining that war is an expensive luxury. The cost of the little unpleasantness with Spain up to the end of March is placed at \$232,000,000. The excess war expenditure over the ordinary peace footing last month was \$11,000,000, which does not include the \$3,000,000 granted to Gomez's soldiers, and the receipts from the internal revenue laws just about cover that amount on an average for the year. The colonial expenses for the succeeding months is estimated at \$12,000,000.

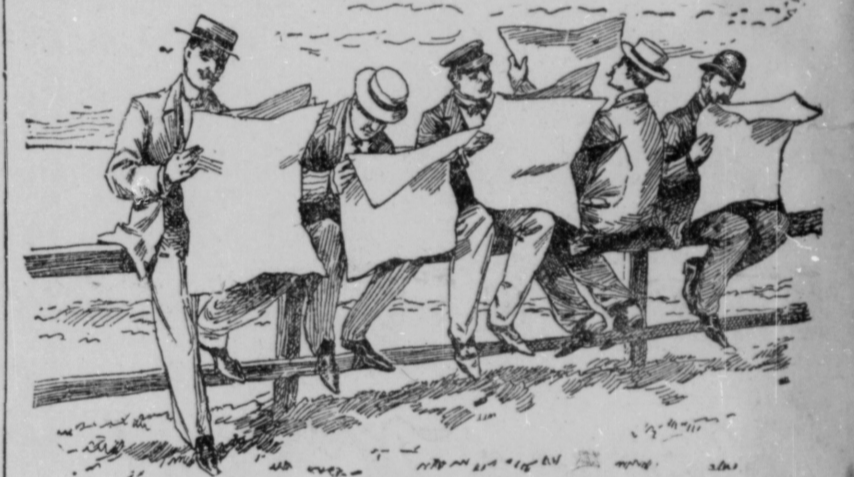

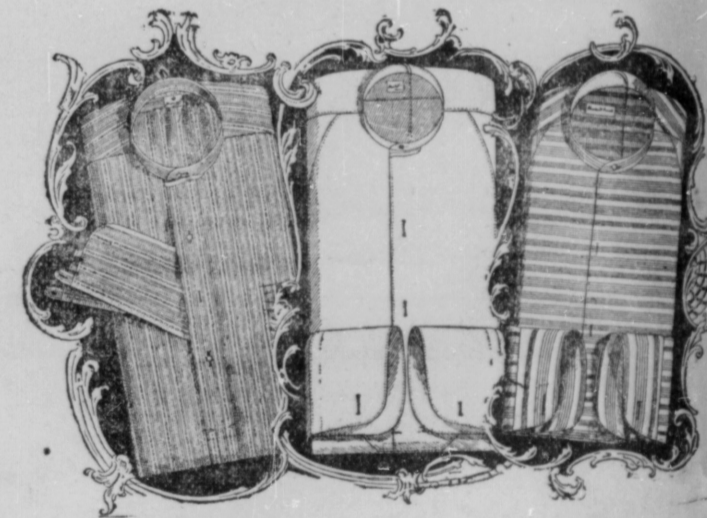
