DURING the thunder storm on Friday last, the barn of George Woods, at Rockingham, twenty-eight miles from Yarmouth, N. S., was struck by lightning and considerably damaged, and two of the four cows in the stalls were killed. MR. DOLORIN, of Big Harbor, Bouslerrie, made a valuable discovery on his farm recently. While digging a cellar he noticed a large pile of stones, and on overturning the pile found a pot of gold. The gold bears an ancient date, and was probably placed there by some of the early French settlers. Mr. Dolorin has sent the gold to the United States to be melted and coined. It is worth between \$2,000 and \$3,000.—North Sydney Herald. A CATHOLIC Industrial School and Orphanage has been established near Halifax, in accordance with the bequest of the late Patrick Power. The property known as Pleasant Valley Farm, at Dutch Village, some 40 acres with buildings, was purchased for \$16,000, the buildings thoroughly refitted, and present accommodation provided for 40 boys, who will be taught practical agriculture. Some \$25,000 has already been expended in establishing the institution, which is in charge of the Christian Brothers. A CORRESPONDENT at Cole Harbor, Guysboro, writes complaining bitterly of the increasing evils of liquor drinking at that place. He says:—"Not long since a young man visited an unlicensed rum shop and after becoming crazed with bad whiskey, started for home. On his way, by the aid of a ladder, he climbed to the top of a neighbor's house. Looming over him, he fell to the ground and received injuries from the effect of which, with previous hurts from like causes, died four days later."

SOME TURNIPS.—A correspondent writes:—"Mr. Herman Macdonald, of Hermannville, again comes to the front, this time with turnips. Mr. Macdonald succeeded in growing this very valuable root to an enormous size this season. Ten turnips filled a barrel, which weighed 18 pounds, an average of 16½ pounds apiece. One single turnip weighed 19 pounds. These mammoth roots can be seen at Mr. Macdonald's office. THE final matriculation examinations were held in Dalhousie University on Friday. There are attending the institution this year 65 undergraduates and 35 general students in the art department. Of this number, 3 hail from New Brunswick, 13 from Prince Edward Island, and 32 from Halifax. The rest come from other parts of Nova Scotia. In the law school there are 39 students, 7 of whom are from New Brunswick. Among the undergraduates there are 4 female students, and 15 of the fair sex are on the list of general students.
