

Student Demonstrators Emerge Again In Viet Nam

SAIGON (AP)—Student demonstrators have emerged again on the South Vietnamese scene and U.S. authorities expressed fear Monday of a new political upheaval.

South Viet Nam still is nursing the wounds of previous political battles in which the students successfully participated. Now the students have taken to the streets again in the cities of Hue and Da Nang, traditional hotbeds of unrest. Saigon students have indicated they may join in soon.

The Saigon government appears unwilling, or unable, to do anything about it.

The agitation was touched off by a government decree that made holders of baccalaureate degrees under the age of 37 eligible for drafting into the army.

AFFECTS PROFESSORS
Many of the professors at Viet Nam's universities fell under this decree and, at their urging, the students began agitating. However, within a few days agitation of the government and a reassessment of the U.S. buildup in Viet Nam.

These demands now appear dominant.

The students have singled out Maj. Gen. Nguyen Van Thieu, chairman of the ruling military junta for attack. They charge that Thieu, 42, a Roman-Catholic who also is chief of state, attained power illegally.

A student newspaper being distributed clandestinely in Hue attacks Premier Nguyen Cao Ky, a Buddhist.

LIST DEMANDS
The students say that their demands can be met in this manner:

—A status-of-forces agreement should be drawn up between the South Vietnamese government and the United States to govern U.S. troops here, with firm controls put on inflation and "social problems" such as venereal disease which the students allege the U.S. troops have created in Viet Nam.

—The present government, appointed by the military junta, should resign and be replaced

by a National Assembly. This National Assembly would be elected by members of the municipal councils which were elected by popular vote in South Viet Nam's main cities last April.

—The draft decree should be modified to permit holders of baccalaureate degrees to work within the armed forces in specialized jobs befitting their knowledge, such as psychological warfare. The students say they are prepared to help in the fight against the Communists.

But if the recent history of student agitation is any indication, these demands are just the beginning.

Urban Renewal Grant For Windsor, N.S.

OTTAWA (CP)—A federal contribution of \$7,500 towards a \$10,000 urban renewal study in Windsor, N.S., was announced Monday by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

The study will be undertaken by Canadian-British Engineering Consultants of Toronto. The provincial government and the municipality will pay the rest of the cost.

PRIZE BELT STOLEN

LONDON (CP)—A boxing belt from the days of bare knuckle fighting has been stolen from a sporting club here. Valued at £550, it was presented to Thomas Savers of England in 1860 after a bout with Thomas Heenan of the United States. The match was a draw after 42 rounds.

After Slump Of 14 Years Coal Is Making Comeback

EDMONTON (CP)—After a 14-year slump, Alberta's coal industry is making a comeback—buoyed by the province's soaring power needs and a healthy export market.

With reserves estimated at five per cent of the world total, Alberta once had no trouble disposing of all the coal its mines could produce.

In 1946 production reached an all-time high of 8,800,000 tons, worth \$33,000,000.

Then the first Ludue oil well blew in and the railways, which had once burned more than 3,000,000 tons of Alberta coal annually, began switching to diesel fuel.

Coal markets sagged. In 1960 coal production was only 2,000,000 tons, the lowest output in more than 50 years.

Today only 45 mines are operating, compared with 399 in one boom year in the 1920s. They employ one-eighth the labor force of the old days.

PRODUCTION CLIMBS
But production is climbing, and is expected to reach 3,700,000 tons this year, the highest output since 1956. For the first time in the province's power history, more than half will go to fueling steam power plants. Exports of "coking coal" to Japan alone topped 600,000 tons last year, and collieries say they could ship up to 2,000,000 tons annually if freight rates were lower.

Provincial officials say Alberta's power capacity, now more than 1,000,000 kilowatts annually, is being expanded by 66 per cent every five years. A

Gov. General Addresses Criminologists

MONTREAL (CP)—Governor-General Georges Vanier delivered the keynote address Monday at the fifth international criminological congress.

Mr. Vanier, who came Sunday with Mme. Vanier from his summer home at Tadoussac, Que., to deliver the opening speech said "law is not exact" and making sure of "the re-summption by offenders of their rightful place in society" is the work of the criminologist.

Mr. Vanier said: "It is the criminal who commits a crime but society bears some of the responsibility."

The Governor-General said the fact that this criminological conference, the first to be held in North America has as its theme "the treatment of offenders" shows that society is concerned with the fate of the offender and "without such concern the law would be a tyrant."

FAMILY SHAKEN
This attitude was necessary as "the great changes in our society" brought about by two world wars and rapid technical advances "have shaken the foundation of the family."

Some 1,300 criminologists from 40 countries are attending the conference.

Claude Wagner, Quebec Justice minister welcomed the delegates and warned that "in attempts to rehabilitate criminals, one must not forget the common good."

Rev. Noel Mailloux, president of the Canadian Criminological Society, was elected president of the congress by acclamation.
