hold a restricted session Monday to discuss measures for reducing international tension and the convening of a five-power conference with Communist China. Unlike regular sessions, deliberations at this meeting presumably would not be made public.

Main point of the Western plan is free all-German elections to set up a representative government, which then would sign a peace treaty and be free to regulate its own international ties. The Soviet counter-plan calls for early formation of an all-German government from the existing East and West zone regimes. This administration would conduct reunited Germany's first elections, with military forces of all four occupying powers withdrawn, except for "limited contingents," prior to voting.

9 Young Skaters Leave For World Ch'ships

TORONTO, (CP)—Nine young skaters left Toronto by air Friday night on the first leg of their journey that will end at the world figure-skating championships and a possible pairs title in Oslo Feb. 15-19.

The Canadian team flies from New York to Copenhagen today and then on to Norway. A few hours before they left Frances Dafeo and Norris Bowden, both of Toronto, judged pre-championship favorites to take the pairs title, held a final practice.

"We've got the best routine we've ever had since skating together," the 27-year-old Bowden, an insurance agent, said in an interview. "It just hope the judges share my feelings."

Sheldon Galbraith, who is coaching six team members, all from the Toronto Skating Club, said the couple's chances of winning are "excellent."

Frances, a 24-year-old costume designer, was happy with their routine "and we can only try our hardest to win."

Second Last Year Miss Dafeo and Bowden, present Canadian and North American pairs champions, placed second in last year's championships at Davos, Switzerland, missing out by only .09 points.

Four Canadians will compete in the women's singles—Barbara Gratton and Ann Johnston of Toronto, Sonja Currie of Calgary and Carole Jane Pacht of Montreal.

Miss Gratton, 17, won the 1953 Canadian senior women's title and placed third in the North American championships. She won the Canadian women's junior title in 1950.

This is the first year of international competition for Miss Johnston, another 17-year-old. She was runner-up in the Canadian women's junior competition in 1952 and 1953.

Miss Pacht, 16, is a native of Czechoslovakia and became a naturalized Canadian in 1950. She trained at Lake Placid, N.Y., for the championships.

Competing in the men's singles are Peter Dunfield and Charles Snelling of Toronto and Douglas Court of St. Catharines.

Following the championships Miss Dafeo and Bowden will take part in the Paris ice festival Feb. 26-27 and have accepted invitations to perform in Germany and Switzerland.

They have not yet decided if they will defend their Canadian title at Calgary Feb. 26-27. The rest of the team will return to Canada immediately after the tournament to compete in the Canadian competition.

CANADIAN APPOINTED LONDON, (CP)—The admiralty has announced that Rear-Admiral P. W. Brock, a native of Kingston, Ont., will become the officer of the Royal Navy's Middle East section next April. Brock, 52, transferred from the Canadian Navy in 1941 and commanded the cruiser HMS Kenya for two years during the Korean war. Subsequently, he was director of operations at the Admiralty. He was promoted to rear-admiral in January.
