AN ISLANDER MISSING.—An Ottawa despatch to the Halifax Chronicle says: W. C. DesBrisay, formerly clerk of the P. E. I. Executive Council, but for some months employed in the government printing bureau here, has been missing for over a week and no trace of him can be found.

GOOD SHOOTING.—At the conclusion of the 82nd Battalion shooting on Monday, an impromptu sweepstakes match was arranged. There were fourteen competitors. The conditions were five shots at 400 yards. Captain D. Stewart won, making 24 points out of a possible 25.

HORSE SOLD.—Mr. D. Stewart, of this city has, we understand, sold his stylish grey Percheron carriage horse to Mr. A. McDougall, of Halifax, for the sum of \$200. The sale was made without even backing the horse out of the stall. The dam of this fine animal was the same as that of Mr. E. Cameron's trotting mare Blackbird.

HARBOR IMPROVEMENTS.—St. John speculators have enlisted American capitalists in a scheme to build a dry dock, wharves, warehouses, etc., on which they propose to expend \$1,000,000. They propose to borrow the money and ask the government to guarantee or contribute towards the interest of the expenditure until the investment becomes a paying venture.

THE MISSION.—The mission in St. Dunstan's Cathedral closed last night with the Papal Benediction, and the Redemptorist Fathers left this morning for Montreal, where they are to give another mission. Yesterday afternoon, they visited the sick and infirm members of the congregation to the number of about one hundred—including those in the hospital and poor-house. The total number of communicants during the mission was about 3,000. There was a general communion yesterday at which about 1,800 persons received the Blessed Sacrament. The Fathers will again visit the Island in July next.

ST. JAMES' HALL.—The fifth annual course of concerts and lectures, under the auspices of the Y. M. L. A. of St. James' Church, began with the concert in St. James' Hall last evening. There was a very good attendance, something like three hundred persons being present. The programme was made up of vocal and instrumental music and readings, and the manner in which the different numbers were executed, met with the hearty approval of the audience. Miss Earle's solo was exceptionally fine. We trust that the success of the opening night will foreshadow the success of the whole course of concerts and lectures.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Another New Railway.

QUEBEC, Nov. 5. A letter has been received from Mr. Bender, C. E., now in London, stating that the syndicate which he has succeeded in forming to build the railway from Quebec to Labrador, connecting with the Grand Trunk at Levis by a bridge over the St. Lawrence, has subscribed the amount necessary to secure the charter and locate the line. If the survey proves satisfactory a company will be formed to build the bridge, purchase the railway from LaBonne St. Ann and continue that line to St. Charles Bay, at the eastern extremity of Labrador, thus forming a direct line between Chicago and England and shortening the ocean passage two and three-quarter days. The length of the projected line from Quebec is 800 miles.

United States Elections.

RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 5. It is estimated that this State has gone Democratic by 4,000 majority.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 5. Indications for the result on the Governor is very close. Foraker is probably defeated and the rest of the Republican ticket is elected.

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Nov. 5. Every indication points to a sweeping Democratic victory.

BOSTON, Nov. 5. Brackett (Republican) is undoubtedly elected.

News from Halifax.

HALIFAX, Nov. 5. St. Mathew's Church was packed to-night with an enthusiastic audience to bid farewell to Rev. John Morton, Mrs. Morton, Rev. F. Coffin, Miss Archibald and Miss Graham, Presbyterian missionaries to Trinidad. The speech of the evening was made by Mrs. Morton.

The compulsory school law is being enforced by the civic authorities. The warship Bellerophon sails for Bermuda to-morrow. Amherst voted for incorporation to-day—majority 37.

The "Mail's" Story Denied.

TORONTO, Nov. 5. The World to-day on the authority of two Cabinet Ministers, denies the Mail's story that the Ontario Government has resolved on the dissolution of the House at once. The Empire makes a strong appeal to the Conservatives to clear the decks for action, and to be ready at any moment for a fight at the polls.

Guy Fawkes' Day.

OTTAWA, Nov. 5. Guy Fawkes Day was celebrated to-day by an Orange procession and mass meeting. About 3000 took part at the mass meeting and resolutions were passed condemning nearly every body except Col. O'Brien, who was the orator and hero of the day.

The Liberals Ready.

LONDON, Nov. 5. Earl Spencer, in a speech at Newcastle to-night, declared the Liberals were ready to produce a measure to pacify Ireland the moment they became responsible for the government of that country.

Paid Over.

MONTREAL, Nov. 5. The Jesuits' estates money, \$400,000, was paid over to-day by the Government. A great many political and ecclesiastical dignitaries were present.

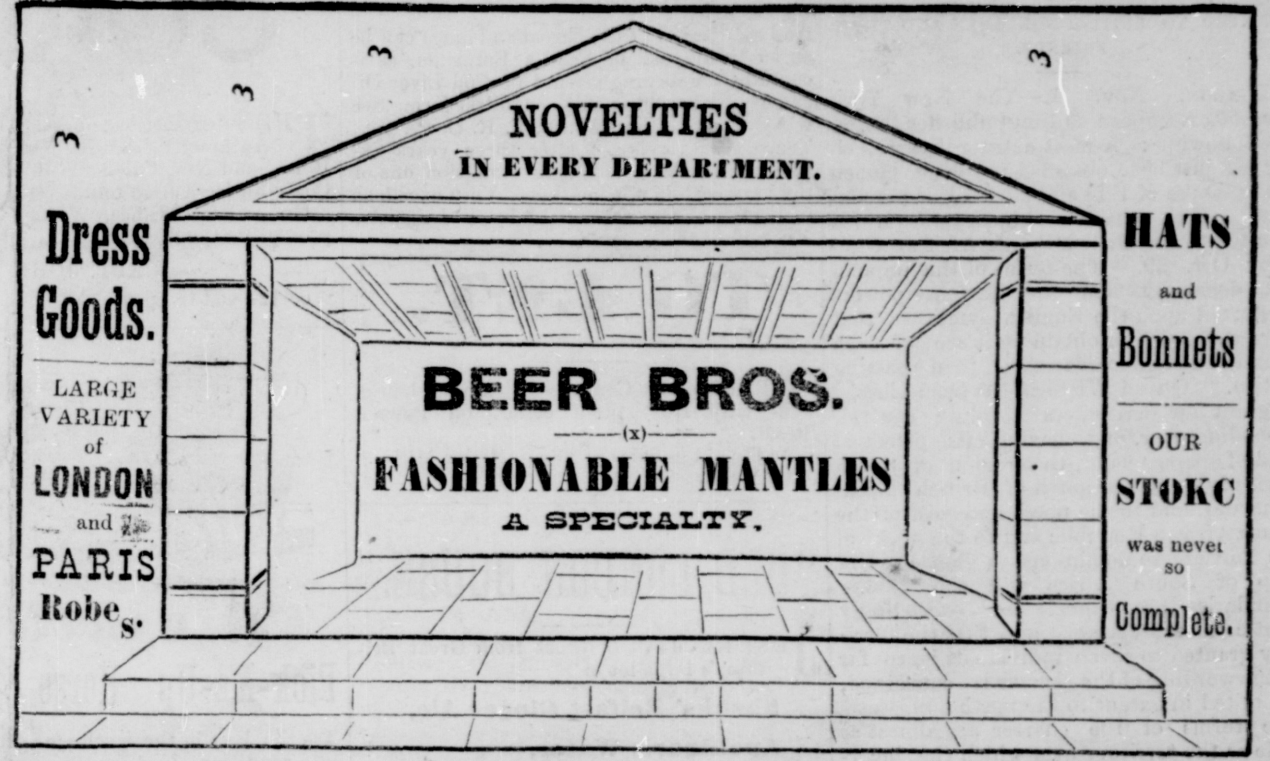
