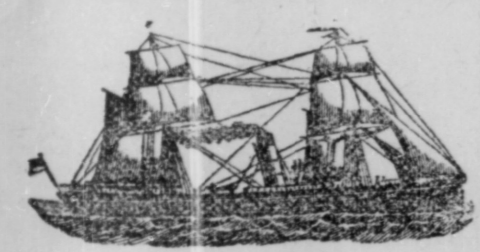

DAIRY PRODUCE.

Cheese Conditions Firm With Demand Fair—Butter Strong Also.

The Montreal Gazette reports the firm feeling in respect to cheese fully maintained. In the country full prices were paid; in fact, in some cases fractional advances were made and, though no radical advance is expected, the approach of the time for fall make works for maintenance of values.

In London according to mail advices there is a fairly good business doing in Canadian cheese both spot and c. i. f. transactions at 38s to 39s per cwt. for white and 40s to 41 for colored, the stock of the latter being comparatively light. In American prices are 38s to 39s for white and 39s to 40s for colored. There is virtually no New Zealand on the market. The stocks of old cheese in London are nearly cleared.

Butter ruled firm at former quotations. London, England, mail advices say:— "There is a considerable change in the appearance of the pastures of the United Kingdom since the last report. Though they are becoming parched, and the yield of milk consequently reduced, yet they are still better than an average for this time of the year. On the continent grass is very plentiful, and though the yield of butter is diminishing this is due more to the natural decrease in those cows which calved in the spring months, than to the falling off in grass food.

"The only colonial butter on the market now is Canadian, which is in larger volume than last year. For the month of July the imports was 13,389 cwt., or 2,089 cwt. over the corresponding month of last year. For the seven months ending July 31, the imports from Canada is 29,133 cwt., or 11,934 cwt. in excess of the same months in 1897. This increase must be very gratifying to Canadians, and it would, undoubtedly, have been much greater had not prices at home been very high and those here very low. The quantity of this season's Canadian butter is very good, and there is also a strong demand.

In the second heat they came in as follows: Provider, Almont Wilkes, Beau Prince, Minnie. Time, 2.30.

In the third heat Minnie led for the first quarter, but broke and was left behind by Provider and Beau Prince, and he in turn was passed by Almont Wilkes. They came in with Provider first; Almont second; Beau Prince third; Minnie fourth.

With reference to Dick Mitchell, who "swept" most of the prizes at the recent electric sports here, it is rumored that he has been suspended.

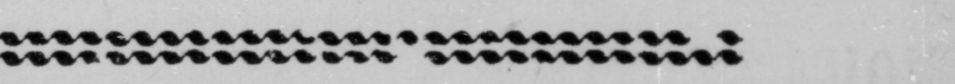
