

TCL President Will Not Offer For Re-election

 OTTAWA (CP)—Percy R. Bengough, British-born machinist who has headed the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada for almost a dozen years, is leaving the presidency of that largest of Canadian labor bodies.

The big 71-year-old labor leader, a veteran of rough-and-tumble union activity through more than half a century, said Friday in an interview he won't be a candidate at the TLC's annual convention in Regina next August.

Mr. Bengough, who has led the 800,000-member congress since 1942, said he feels he has been in office long enough and is quitting to give other TLC men a chance at what is regarded as one of the top jobs in the Canadian labor movement.

The position pays around \$13,000 a year. The president gets a \$9,600 salary and an expense allowance of \$10 a day.

SPECULATE ON SUCCESSOR

Speculation as to a probable successor—who will be chosen on a year-to-year basis at Regina—centered immediately around the six other officers of the congress, and it was about certain that the new president would come from one of these.

A leading contender, should he decide to run, would be Gordon Dunning, formerly of Calgary, who has been at Ottawa headquarters for five years as the only other full-time officer elected by congress conventions.

Other prospects would be among these five regional vice-presidents: James A. Whitebone of Saint John, N. B.; Claude Jodoin of Montreal, William Jenoves of Toronto, Carl Berg of Edmonton and R. K. Gervin of Vancouver.

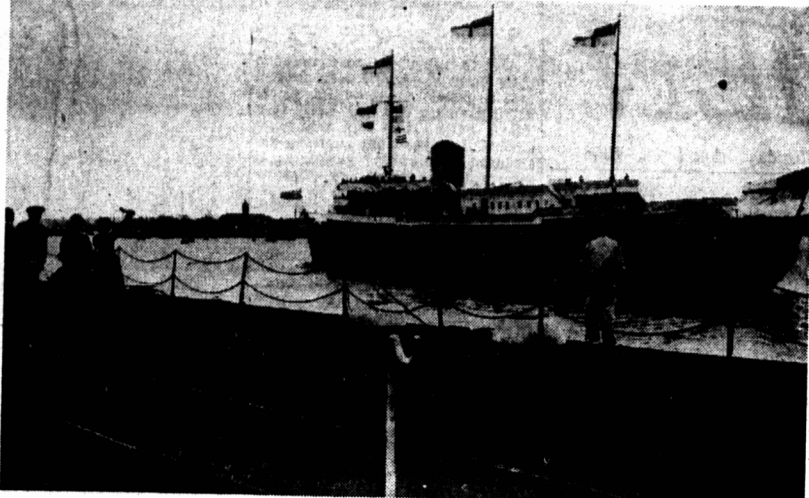

Royal Yacht Britannia's Dual Role



The royal yacht, Britannia, now carrying Prince Charles and his sister, Princess Anne, to Tobruk, North Africa, for a May 1st reunion with their parents, Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh, was designed to become a hospital ship in the event of war. Built at a cost of \$5,000,000, the Britannia, seen above, was designed to operate for 2,000 miles at 20 knots, with extra fuel capacity for extending this range. A single funnel is in keeping with a well-balanced profile, a graceful and dignified appearance. She is 412 feet 3 inches in over-all length, with a maximum beam of 55 feet and a gross tonnage of 5,769.

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Cubans Use Some Sparkling Baseball Jargon

 HAVANA (AP)—Cubans mix a splash of Latin-twisted English with their lively Spanish and come up with a sparkling baseball jargon.

Excitable Cuban fans of this island's favorite sport scream "jandron" (pronounced hon-ron) when a ball sails out of Havana's Gran stadium. The phrase is so popular it appears written that way in the newspapers.

But blended with this cry is another of pure Spanish—"volo la 50cerca" (over the fence).

A two-base hit sparks yells of something that sounds like "too-bay." A triple is "tree-bay."

The outfielders, literally translated, are gardeners (jardineros). A long time ago, the Cubans fashioned one expression which is pure English but is not used or even heard in Canada or the United States. They say "dead ball" when the pitcher hits a batter, and they carry it that way in the boxscores.

A favorite chant of the Cubans heard on occasions when the home team appears headed for a shutout victory. About the seventh inning, the crowd starts to roar "neuve zeros" (nine zeros) when the pitcher hits a batter, and they carry it that way in the boxscores.

Selke Charges Three-Way Clique Among NHL Teams

MONTREAL (CP)—Managing director Frank Selke of Montreal Canadiens in a statement Friday said there "appears to be a three-way clique" among National Hockey League teams.

Selke's statement followed his return from an NHL meeting in New York where the new draft and supplementary legislation were approved.

Selke said he felt "we were moving a bit too rapidly" regarding a clause dealing with over-age juniors and players who had signed A and B forms. Because of the extent of Canadiens' "Hockey empire and junior affiliations," he asked that action on the clause be deferred one year.

"Boston supported this stand but the opposition, led by Conn Smythe (president and managing director of Toronto Maple Leafs) and Clarence Campbell, (NHL president) was too strong for us, voting us down 4-2."

Bettors Record For Shot Put

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP)—Parry O'Brien, handsome giant who used to perform for Southern California, bettered his own world record for the shot put at the Drake relays Saturday.

O'Brien's toss was 59 feet, 9 1/2 inches which compares with his official world record of 59 feet, 2 1/2 inches.

Meet officials said O'Brien's great toss will not count as a world record because fewer than three athletes competed in the exhibition.

The meet was dominated by the University of Kansas and its great distance runner, Wes Santee, who turned in a 4:07.4 anchor mile as his team won in 9:50.4 in the distance medley relay.
