When Canada adopts economic controls again, there should be the definite agreement that such controls would not be released until all danger of inflation, such as we have experienced in the past few years, has passed.

"While we do not believe that another war is inevitable, yet the threat of war is sufficiently great that a program of all-round preparedness is the only wise course. For economic controls, the Government would be well-advised to name a commission immediately to study and recommend the proper balance within our economy which could be used as the basis for just and effective over-all controls, if and when they are needed."

Cabinet May Reconsider Sending Troops To Korea

OTTAWA, July 27-(CP) - The question of providing ground troops for the United Nations in Korea is again under cabinet consideration, at least informally. There is as yet no sign that the Government intends to shift its position of exactly a week ago that no Canadian ground troops will be sent "at this stage."

But the action of Britain, Australia, New Zealand, Turkey and Thailand in offering that form of aid has placed a new light on the Canadian position.

Key cabinet ministers were expected to discuss this development during the day. However, the entire cabinet was partially occupied by the funeral of former Prime Minister Mackenzie King, a factor which forced postponement of the regular Wednesday meeting.

Any cabinet decision to send ground troops would not be made in a rush, and, once made, would take the form of a recommendation to a re-assembled Parliament. There is some speculation that Parliament will be recalled to get an airing of opinions on whether Canada should take that step.

These vary from the year or so it would take to marshal a division to the brief period it would take to dispatch, say, a small force of regulars. One potential action is formation of a commonwealth force now that several commonwealth countries are in. The government, in its reply to Trygve Lie's call for more aid to U. N. in Korea, offered consideration of an international force recruited by the U. N. At Lake Success, this international force idea remains active but it has not crystallized nor does it show immediate signs of doing so.
