LAMBS SHIPPED.—Mr. John H. Henry shipped from Summerside on Monday morning a fine lot of lambs, two hundred in number, to Messrs. Doble & Maxfield, Bangor, Me.

THE GLOUCESTER FLEET.—It is said that the loss to the shipping interests of Gloucester has been larger than ever before in the history of the port. Ten schooners have been lost with 100 lives.

MARKET NEWS.—The Ralph B. Peake, as already reported, arrived yesterday evening, after a very rough passage of 22 days. CANADA'S PROGRESS.—Some complain of the progress of Canada in comparison with the United States. Such persons are not familiar with the facts, and simply base their ideas on superficial appearances. However, it must be confessed, says the Hamilton Spectator, that Canada is a little slow. Her railway mileage is only a little greater in proportion to population than that of the United States. Her foreign trade is only 50 per cent greater than that of the United States. Her shipping is only three times as great in proportion to population as that of the United States. The Canadian farmer gets only 20 bushels of wheat to the acre, while the United States farmer gets 13 bushels.

IN THE TUNNEL.—Two young men in the Salem excursion to Newport last week, says the Salem Mass. Journal, played a rather sweet joke on their wives. NAVAL.—The Blake will leave Halifax for Bermuda next week.

FOR DRILL.—The Charlottetown Engineers will meet for drill to-night at 8 o'clock.

SCARLET FEVER.—This disease is very prevalent in St. John. Up to Saturday last twenty-five cases had been reported at the office of the Board of Health.

SERVICES AT LONG CREEK.—There will be a service and celebration of the Holy Communion in St. Thomas' (Anglican) Church, Long Creek, on Sunday, 29th inst., at 11 o'clock.

POLICE COURT.—The docket this forenoon consisted of three simple drunks and one drunk and disorderly. James Callaghan was charged with the latter offence and was fined \$10 or 20 days. The other three, James McGaughey, James Macdonald and Benjamin Henry, were disposed of for fines of \$2 or 8 days each.

ISLAND CHEESE.—Mr. Dillon informs THE EXAMINER that there were nine cheese from Prince Edward Island shown at the World's Fair, and not nineteen, as stated in the Montreal Free Press. Of these nine cheese, prizes were given for eight. This is certainly a most excellent showing.

THE CONTEXT BAZAAR.—On Wednesday and Thursday, the 8th and 9th November, a tea, fancy sale and apron fair, in aid of the Convent de Notre Dame, will be held in the Lyceum. The ladies in charge are making every effort in order that this may be the most successful affair of the kind ever held in Charlottetown. Further particulars will be published later.

THE POLINO.—The steamer Polino arrived here from Montreal shortly before ten o'clock this morning with a full general cargo. She will leave for Picton and St. John's as soon as the weather moderates. Her outgoing cargo will include horses, cattle and sheep on deck, and produce, etc., under deck.

THE HOOPER CASE.—The preliminary investigation into the Hooper wife-poisoning case is in progress at Joliet, Que. The proceedings on Monday were of a rather farcical character, the time of the court for a considerable period being taken up discussing a letter concerning Hooper which appeared in one of the papers. At this distance it would seem as if the case against Hooper had about collapsed.

THE COBAN.—The steamer Colan, Captain Robert Fraser, arrived from Montreal this morning about half-past seven with a general cargo and the following passengers: Mrs. A. S. Jennings and two children, Mrs. E. Winslow, S. Collett, O. G. Hill, Mrs. Greaves and child. She will leave for St. John's on Wednesday evening, weather permitting. She will take produce below decks, and horses, cattle and sheep on deck.

NEW BAUSWICK CROPS.—Nathaniel Morehouse, Upper Blackville, raised this year one half-acre of land 72 lbs. of turnips, 1100 pumpkins, 150 head of cabbage, 4 lbs. of beans, 3 lbs. of potatoes, 1 bushel peas and one-half bushel of tomatoes.

A Swedish trap, raised on Dr. Pallock's farm, measures three feet in circumference and weighs 23 lbs. There are many other big ones, but this was the monarch of the field.—Chatham World.

MORE LOBSTER FINES.—This forenoon, before A. Lord, Esq., Fishery Officer, the following persons were fined for fishing and having in their possession lobsters in the close season: L. H. McLellan, Nine Mile Creek, \$20 and costs; Stephen McLellan, Charlottetown, \$20 and costs; E. H. Norton, two fines of \$20 and costs. Several other cases will come up for trial this afternoon. The case of John McLord, of Mount Buchanan, has been postponed for one week, as the witnesses are in Halifax on the cruiser Kingfisher.

A SAD ACCIDENT.—Kenny Mailman, son of Albert Mailman, of Baker Settlement, Queen's County, Nova Scotia, left home with his gun on the 11th inst., for the purpose of shooting partridges. After the report of a gun was heard in the direction he had gone. Night came, but Kenny did not. Next morning a searching party left for the woods and some rods from the shore of Cook's Lake in a few feet of water. It is supposed that he shot a duck in the lake, and on wading out after it, stepped over the ledge and being unable to swim, drowned. Deceased was 17 years of age.—Gold Hunter.

A SENSATIONAL STORY.—The Rocky Mountain News publishes a sensational story to the effect that Dr. J. Thatcher Graves, who committed suicide by taking poison in his cell while awaiting a new trial for the murder of Mrs. Barnard, the wealthy Providence, R. I., woman, is still alive. It declares that the body, carried from the jail on the morning of September 15th last, was a cleverly constructed figure of wax made to resemble Graves in face and form, and that the powerful influence of Graves secured his removal from the prison to a safe retreat. The coroner and other officials at Denver who examined the body laugh at the story and declare it one of the silliest hoaxes ever attempted.

A REVIVAL: STOPS BUSINESS.—The town of Patochogue, L. I., is feeling the effects of a revival of religion, and on Friday night last, according to a despatch, almost every store was closed, and the whole population, or as much of it as could crowd into the Congregational Church, was hanging upon the words of Rev. Arthur J. Smith, of New York, who is personally conducting the assembly upon the steps of St. Andrew's church. Hundreds of persons who have never attended church before have astonished believers and the careless alike by seeking on this occasion the means of grace with fervent eagerness. The scoffers are at a loss to account for this sudden metamorphosis, and the school-keepers are standing in knots on the corners of the thoroughfares asking each other if the millennium is really at hand.
