A Benediction for Round Shoulders. Anybody can cure round shoulders by a very simple and easy exercise. The round-shoulder man, should go into the open air three or four times a day, let his hands drop to his sides, and then, while inhaling the air, raise himself on his toes as high as he can. 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THINGS WORTH KNOWING.

Various Names for the Great Father of Waters. The Mississippi was the last of a long list of names proposed for our great river. De Soto called it "The River of the Holy Spirit," and the Portuguese, who wrote an account of De Soto's wandering, called it the Rio Grande. In an effort to settle on a name for the Spanish called it Rio de la Paludosa. Rio de la Eulata, Rio de la Soya, Rio Chucungu, Rio de Escudillo, the Lost River, and other names. Maguette gave it the name I Riveiro de la Comencion. Jean Bonpland denominated it the Colbert, and other French explorers called it the St. Louis and Grande Riviere. The French finally settled on the name Mississippi, an Indian designation, and this name, with slight change, became universally accepted.

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
