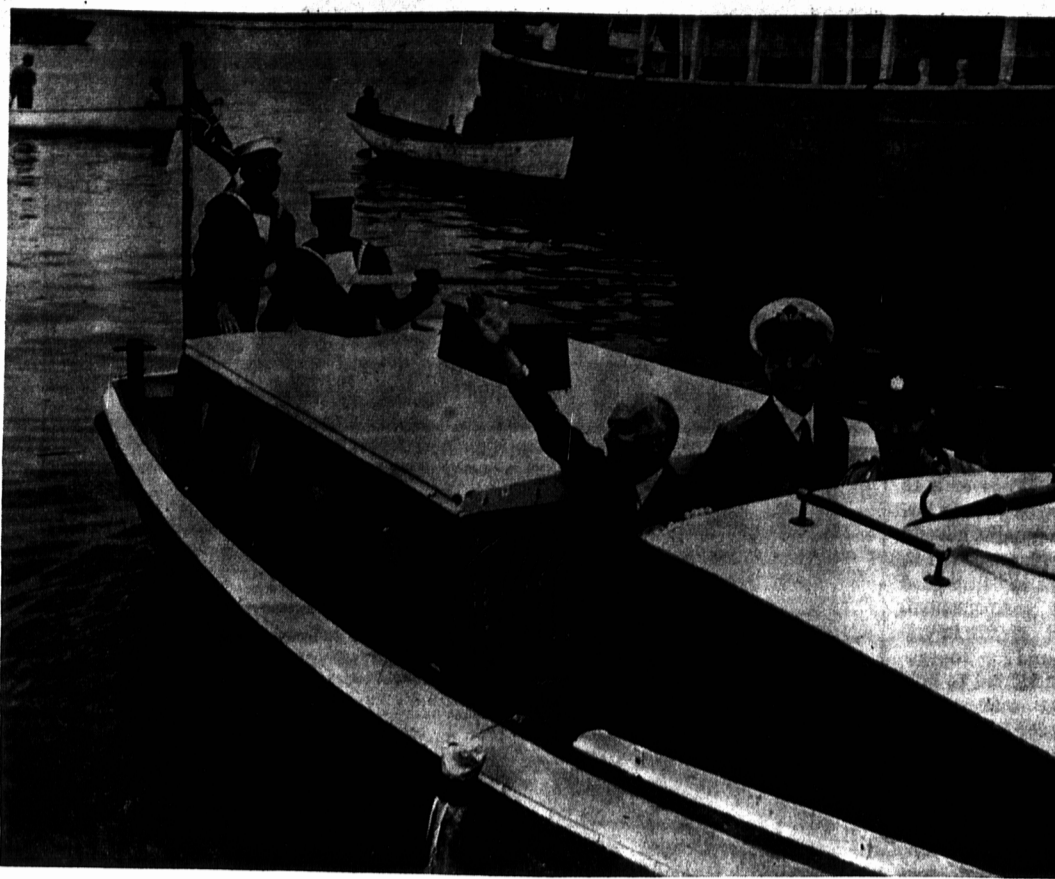

Of all the Governors-General of
Canada, none has travelled so far
or visited so many remote outposts
in ships of the Royal Canadian
Navy as has His Excellency the
Rt. Hon. Vincent Massey.

He is also probably the first
Governor-General who ever com-
posed an "ode" to a small craft
of the RCN, something which came
about as a result of two voyages
in late summer, one to northeast-
ern Newfoundland and the other to
St. Lawrence River and Gulf ports
in the frigate Buckingham.

Because of her duties as training
ship for HMCS Cornwallis, the
Buckingham has earned the nick-
name of "The Fundy Flyer", but
it is doubtful whether this name
will ever become as famous as
that of her motor cutter, the "Saucy
Sally". It was to the latter that
His Excellency dedicated his ode.

Not many of the ports visited
had facilities for berthing a 2,400-
ton warship. That is where the
"Saucy Sally" entered the picture.
She was the link between ship and
shore for the vice-regal party —
a rather lively link at times, but
one that never faltered in the per-
formance of her duties, despite her
coquettish appearance. For she
had been made really "tididley" by
the ship's company. Her brass and
paintwork gleamed and she was
adorned with fringes of fancifully
worked canvas.

DEDICATE ALL DEEDS TO CREATOR'S SERVICE

When we watch an accomplished
athlete making a difficult play with
ease and grace, we realize that the
simplicity of his action is the re-
sult of long hours and years of
training. Too often we do not keep
this in mind when we are told that
the first and greatest command-
ment is simply to love God.

We will save ourselves much dis-
couragement and frustration if we
look upon simplicity in our love of
God as a goal to be achieved,
rather than as a starting point.
The simplicity of the dove goes
along with the wisdom of the ser-
pent and we cannot expect to start
off with the one any more than we
can with the other.

As we know, our training in the
love of God is in keeping the com-
mandments—"If you love Me,
keep my commandments." Our
growth in the love of God can be
measured by the spirit in which
we keep the commandments. The
prophet Isaiah lists seven different
spirits as marks of the Messias
and so of His followers also. These
range from the spirit of wisdom
to the spirit of the fear of the
Lord, which is the beginning of
wisdom.

Fear of the Lord is a rever-
ence like that which a child has
for his parents, when he obeys
them because he hates to dis-
please those whom he loves. If
we have the spirit of the fear
of the Lord, we keep all the com-
mandments, trusting in God's
wisdom when we fail to un-
derstand the reason why some
things are forbidden.

DEDICATE ALL
By the spirit of piety we go be-
yond an aversion from what is for-
bidden, by dedicating in a positive
way all that we do to the service
of God in token of our gratitude
to Him for all the benefits we
have received from Him, which
we can never fully repay.

Although we might think that
the spirit of reverence and the
spirit of piety simplify our lives
as much as possible, the spirit
of knowledge brings complications.
When we are beginning to serve
God we must necessarily keep
many of the commandments blind-
ly without knowing exactly what
is expected of us or the reason for
it.

However, God's wisdom is be-
hind all the commandments, and,
if we keep them faithfully, God
lets us see the reasons behind them
and at the same time we are able
to see how far our actions fall
short of what is expected of us.
Where once everything seemed so
simple and clearcut, we discover
more and more instances where
it is a difficult and delicate prob-
lem to reconcile the claims of
justice and mercy, truth and char-
ity.

The spirit of fortitude makes us
face up to our problems honestly
and patiently, especially those prob-
lems which do not seem to yield
at all. Thus we become humble
enough to ask and wait for answers
from God. When we allow God to
instruct us on the manner in which
we are to keep His command-
ments, we are living by the spirit
of counsel, and our lives become
more and more worthy of a child
of God.

SHUN WRONG MOTIVE
The danger here is that we will
glory too much in our success,
become vain, and do the right
things for the wrong reason. Again-
st all forms of duplicity and van-
ity, the intention of our wills must
be strengthened and simplified.
If we do receive this help from
God, we will experience greater en-
lightenment, because then our love
of God is mature and in that love
we possess the most adequate im-
age of God that is possible on this
earth.

Through being so much like God
by our love, we are able to see
things from His point of view and
we are able to catch a glimpse of
His over-all plan in His dealings
with us. This distinguishes the
spirit of understanding from the
spirit of knowledge.

Finally, another kind of know-
ing is involved when we not only
possess a mature love of God in
our hearts, but are actually en-
gaged in the act of the love of
God. One who loves God with his
whole heart and soul, mind and
strength, is the only one who can
really appreciate something of the
meaning of God because his know-
ledge of God is not through any
created likeness but through love
which reaches out to God himself.

Thus, we must keep all the other
commandments in the right spirit
before we come to possess that
purity and simplicity of heart
which endows us with the spirit of
wisdom and the ability to ob-
serve properly the first and great-
est commandment.
