A Goodly Company at the Banquet Last Evening.

The farewell banquet in honor of the Honorable David Laird, P. C., was attended by about seventy-five gentlemen of both political parties including:

He declined to enter into questions of politics for fear he might be accused of offensive partisanship, but briefly referred to some points in his journalistic and civic career. Local and Other Items.

CITY TAXES.—Beware of the list of unpaid taxpayers. Pay up at once and avoid the exposure.

FOOTBALL.—The Dalhousie team defeated the Wanderers at Halifax on Monday. The score stood 3 to 0. The game was fast from start to finish.

IN THE FIELD.—We understand that Councillor Crable will be a candidate for Sewer and Water Commissioner in succession to Hon David Laird.

MUST HAVE BEEN EXCITING.—A raccoon about a foot and a half long was captured on one of the principal residential streets of Moncton last Thursday evening by a dog, a man and a regiment of small boys. The raccoon ran up a tree, where it was lassoed and brought down.

NEW CHAIRMAN.—The Water Commissioners held a sitting yesterday, at which the Hon D Laird resigned his position as Chairman of the Board. The office was immediately afterwards filled by the appointment of Mr Henry Smith as Chairman.

ACADIA'S GOOD FORTUNE.—Of the \$60,000 required by Acadia college to enable it to secure the \$15,000 offered by J D Rockefeller, some \$50,000 has been raised, and the Yarmouth Times says a considerable contribution will be made towards the balance by citizens of that town.

POLICE COURT.—Five drunks figured at the Police Court this morning. Patrick Cullen, Joseph Cameron, Charles Thistle and John Bell were each fined \$5 or 30 days. William Rodd, against whom a similar charge was preferred, was remanded until to-morrow. A charge of assault and battery preferred against Patrick Cullen, and Joseph Cameron, was dismissed.

ANOTHER SEIZURE.—A Sydney despatch of the 6th says: The St. Pierre schooner R W Smith, with a large quantity of smuggled liquor and tobacco, was seized here to-night by Captain Gordon, of the revenue cutter Gladiator. The officials had been on the watch for the vessel for some days, and as soon as she arrived in port to-night, Captain Gordon captured her. The contraband goods were stowed between false bulkheads and are valued at about \$3,000.

THE GOLDEN RULE.—According to an exchange Samuel M Jones is the "golden rule" mayor of Toledo, Ohio. He was born in poverty, but has become prosperous through his own exertions. He owns a big factory in which the employees work about eight hours a day and enjoy numerous holidays. The only rule he has posted up is: "Do unto others as if you were the others." At Christmas he shares with the workmen the profits of the past year. Strikes ought to be unknown in his establishment.

SCHOONER WRECKED.—The Summerside correspondent of the Guardian says: The schooner Mary, Captain Thomas Hare, owned by Mr Charles Powell, of Dalhousie, bound from Pictou to Gaspe, with 180 tons coal, sprung a leak Saturday and made so much water that the crew with all their efforts could not keep her free with 1,000 strokes an hour. At 9 o'clock Saturday night with a furious gale from the east and north east, she struck the Munnings shoals, but was carried over them by the heavy sea. The water continued to gain and at 1 p. m. Sunday she sank about 10 miles off Horsehead near Munnings in 20 fathoms of water. The crew consisting of five men and the captain landed in the boat and came to Summerside Monday afternoon, where they still remain.

EX-SECRETARY BAYARD.—The official period of mourning having expired the flag on the United States Consulate, which has been floating at half-mast during the past ten days out of respect to the memory of Ex-Secretary Bayard, occupies its old position at the top of the staff. In the circular ordering that the flag be displayed at half-mast it is pointed out that Hon. Mr. Bayard served the people of the United States in many and important capacities. He represented Delaware as Senator from 1869 to 1885, was Secretary of State from 1885 to 1889, and was Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the United States to Great Britain from 1893 to 1897. In each of these capacities, it is further pointed out, his career was marked by great usefulness in which abilities of a high order were applied with untiring devotion and fidelity to the performance of public trusts. His private life was pure and unspotted, and his memory will long be cherished with affection and respect by his countrymen.
