MUSICAL FESTIVAL Syllabus News.

The 1953 Music Festival Syllabus is now available. Mr. Raymond Player, former organist of Trinity United Church, Charlottetown, chose our test pieces this year with Mrs. Edwin Johnstone assisting. We have 166 classes as compared to last year's 157.

The Syllabus Committee felt that boy's piano entries might be encouraged by making separate classes for boys only of 12 and 14 years of age. This was done in piano solo and piano duet classes. Boys will now have a better chance to make the "ribboned" rank, and pieces that suit the masculine temperament have been chosen for these four classes.

To make for more equal competition the section "Schools of Nine Rooms and Over" applies this year only to urban centres i. e. Charlottetown and Summerside. At present we have several rural towns with large schools; they may now enter the class designated as "Schools of Four Rooms and Over" (Rural).

The majority of classes in dancing have been taken straight from the "Curriculum Guides in Physical Education" used throughout the schools of the province. These classes along with Square Dancing, Scotch Dancing, and an open class make up the Dancing Syllabus.

Those interested in Choral Reading will be glad to know that the staff of the Charlottetown Public Library have kindly consented to hold for distribution typewritten copies of all the test pieces.

Prospective entrants who have not secured or ordered music run the risk of being unable to secure the selected test piece. Other Festivals may exhaust the supply unless you order early.

The Festival Association was heartened last year by the increase in adult participants. All across Canada the lack of adult participation has been deplored. May we hope for City Choir entries this year?

We have a new adjudicator this year—Earle Terry of London, Ontario, a specialist in vocal and orchestral work. You will read more about him and last year's Mr. Geen in our next publicity.
