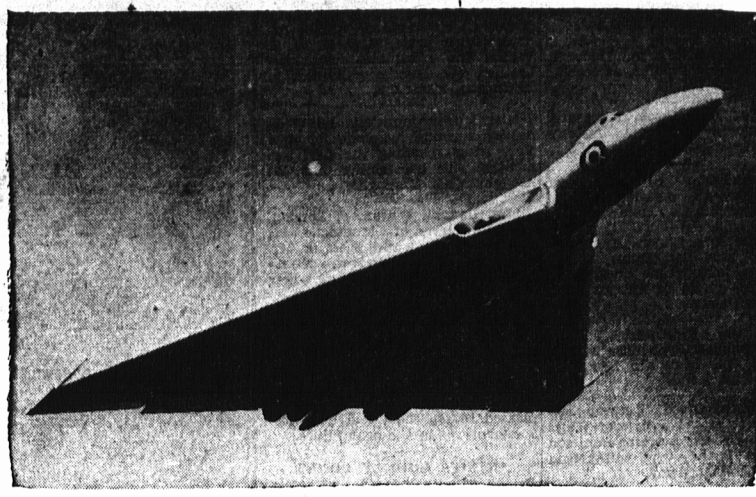

Britain Unveils Her Best Jet Bomber



Britain's newest and best bomber to date is seen in the air as it was unveiled at the air show put on by the Society of British Aircraft Constructors at Farnborough before 28,000 visitors from the free nations. Known as the Avro A 698, it is believed to be the first four-jet operational Delta-winged bomber in the world. Duncan Sandy, Britain's minister of supply, reported the bomber would be

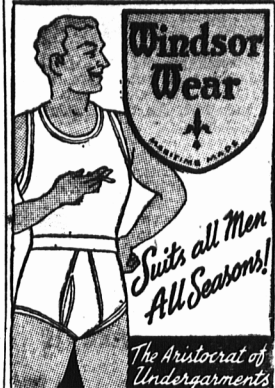
able to attain a speed approaching that of sound and to carry a very large bomb load over great distances. He also stated the government had decided to order "an appreciable number" of the planes without waiting for the prototype to carry out the usual flying trials. The Delta fighter looks like a large-size Javelin, which Britain says is the world's best.

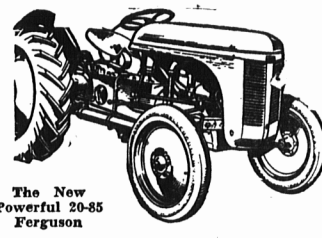
