

Democrats Shift Attack On Eisenhower Government

WASHINGTON (CP)—The Democrats Wednesday shifted their line of attack on the Eisenhower administration to the twin issues of big business and special interests.

The question of President Eisenhower's "millionaire" cabinet is now the center of the campaign for the U.S. presidential election. But Walter E. Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee, pressed it with fresh vigor as he launched a tour of New York, one of the key cities in the Nov. 6 voting.

Addressing a luncheon of businessmen supporters, he pictured the Democratic party as the friend of the small merchant and said the Republicans have done nothing to halt a "march of big business" which is threatening the extinction of small business.

The Republicans, he asserted, have "confused genuine friendship for business with a smuggling in-

timacy toward a few of its giants," with the result that "the big have gotten bigger and the small are disappearing."

Stevenson thus opened a new bid for the support of small business, a step Eisenhower took last week when he offered tax reductions and other tax benefits to small businesses if he and his administration are returned to power.

In Detroit, the big industrial centre which Stevenson carried by presidential running-mate, Estes Kefauver, urged election of a Democratic party "which believes that national prosperity means prosperity evenly distributed among all the people and not just the giant corporations."

DEFENDS POSITION

He criticized Eisenhower for placing the bulk of the government's spending power and economic power in the hands of two of the biggest "business" names in the Eisenhower cabinet—Defense Secretary Charles Wilson, former head of General Motors

Corporation, and Treasury Secretary George Humphrey, former head of a multi-million-dollar corporate empire.

On the other side of the political fence, Eisenhower produced before a labor audience in Washington a statistical defence against the Democratic claim that his administration favors big business.

"During the years 1946-52, inclusive," he said, "corporate profits—after taxes—averaged 7.7 per cent of the national income. During the period since 1953, when this administration entered office, corporate profits—after taxes—have averaged 6. per cent of the national income."

Meantime, Stevenson's H-bomb test ban proposal continued to generate much of the heat of the campaign and Vice-President Richard Nixon, touring the mid-west, said that a vote for Stevenson would be "a vote for weakness, for indecision and for the inexperienced which could lead to war."
