ACWW Hold Inspiring Program At Maple Leaf Gardens, Toronto

WITH THE ACWW IN TORONTO — Canada entertained her visitors to ACWW Conference with a ceremony and pageant at Maple Leaf Gardens this afternoon and evening, about 12,000 women from Canada and U.S.A. together with overseas delegates filled the Gardens to capacity.

At the afternoon ceremony, Hon. Stuart S. Garson, Minister of Justice and Solicitor General for Canada, welcomed the delegates on behalf of Canadian Government and paid tribute to the contribution the Women of the World can make towards ending peace.

Junior Farmer's choir sang suitable selections at the afternoon program. One song had been written especially for this occasion called "Canada, Dear Canada."

Greetings were extended by the representatives of 27 different countries. These women were all dressed in native costume. Kathleen Stokes gave an organ solo. Mrs. Raymond Sayre, retiring president of ACWW, stated that this had been the largest and most successful conference held since the war.

Fabrics Are Biggest Concern Of Canadian Women of Fashion

Canadian women aren't too much concerned about the "ups and downs" of fashions this fall. A Canadian Press survey of the fall shows indicates they are preoccupied with fabrics.

"Three-dimensional" type fabrics are popular for coats. Combinations of jersey with other materials and tweeds are much in evidence for daytime wear. Heavy autumn cottons are making a hit in a number of western cities.

As for color, black will be the top choice in Nova Scotia, Quebec, Montreal and Edmonton. The rest of the west, and Toronto, incline towards an ever-increasing range of browns—changing from the deep brown and bronze shades to the cinnamons and champagnes.

Interest in the stole seems country-wide, and the suit with a stole will appear in a number of large centres. Fur stoles tend to the triangular, putting them closer to the cape classification—a lot easier to handle.

The blonde fur coat retains its popularity and the short-haired pelts, such as beaver and sheared raccoon, will be much in evidence. The nylon "furs" are being eyed, too.

Incidentally some fashion authorities report Paris frequently looking fondly over her shoulder to the days of the fox furs. Some Parisians never relinquished them. The modified pyramid fabric coat held sway last year, and this year it's modified even more. One color, in a graduation of shades, will be popular in the fabric coat.

Suits are marked "tweed" in the east, but in the west reports indicate worsted has the advantage. In Edmonton novelty worsted flannel suits with splash shades are in the lead. Vancouver is habitant.

ling on worsted flannel suits too with Oxford grey making a good showing. Quebec is the only city to list tweed cloaks in the fall showings.

Waltz-length evening dresses will be worn this autumn, according to many department stores. Quebec City however apparently prefers the floor-length.

Quebec also reports a cocktail dress of taffeta with low neck and back, and full skirt, whereas Toronto notes a trend away from taffeta to less crisp fabrics such as the silks.

College toggers will likely feature many of the leather and suede jackets, vests and trims. The heavy-knit bulky sweater may be making a comeback in Toronto but this may not be too evident this fall.

Snug little hats are pretty well the national choice for fall. The urban influence with a deft touch of drapery evidently holds wide appeal for the women of Winnipeg.

A wide choice is presented in shoes. A mere network of straps for evening wear, and Louis heels are still evident. Suedes hold their popularity, and Montrealeers are tripping around in a lot of patent leather while turning a favorable eye on a new beige satin robe.

Buried in all the advices from across Canada is a faint whisper of skirts being just a little shorter.

GLAND TYPE OF OVERWEIGHT  
While 90 to 95 per cent of overweight is caused by eating more food than the body needs, it is only fair to say that the 5 to 10 per cent of cases should be given the treatment they need — gland treatment. Although most of these gland cases of overweight are due to an underactive thyroid gland, other underactive glands causing overweight are the pituitary gland, lying on the floor of the skull; the adrenal glands, situated one above each kidney; and the male and female sex glands.

Household Scrapbook

Washing Overalls  
If the overalls are stained with grease, rub the spots well with lard. Then lay on the washboard and scrub with a stiff brush and warm suds containing a little borax or ammonia. If paint-spotted, boil in water containing one tablespoon of turpentine to each gallon.

Photographs  
To clean photographs, sponge very lightly with a bit of absorbent cotton wet with alcohol, and let dry by evaporation.

Overshoes  
Dingy looking rubber overshoes can be made presentable by washing with water containing a few drops of ammonia, and then giving a thin coat of liquid shoe dressing.

Hints for Your Home

The best way to dry rinsed jewelry is to put it in a box of sawdust, shake it about a little so that it is covered, and leave it. Sawdust will absorb all moisture.

Soaking clothes overnight in still water tends to give them a grayish cast. All the good that can be accomplished by soaking takes place in the first 15 minutes.

Glass bowls or vases need washing in heavy suds when you change flowers or greens; otherwise a highwater ring may mar their crystal clearness.  
Divide your hamper with a heavy cardboard to make partition, keeping white and coloured clothes separated. This suggestion may save you time when it comes to sorting.
