

### Talking About No Windup

NEW YORK (AP) — Someone asked Casey Stengel at a press conference whether he thought Don Larsen's world series success with the no-windup pitch would prompt others to try the same thing next year.

"Well," the New York Yankee manager said, taking a full windup, "you can make mistakes with it. Larsen walked four men in a game not long ago, but you maybe don't walk so many."

"There was a guy named Hogan with Kansas City Monarchs who used to do it, and Larry Cheney didn't take a windup, which was because he had a bad knee and couldn't turn. He stayed up for seven or eight years with it."

"When I first went to Kansas City..."

"Just a minute, please," Jackie Farrell, the club's promotion man, interrupted. "Mr. Weiss would like to say something."

General Manager George Weiss was standing in the doorway, waiting for a chance to make his little announcement.

"I just wanted to tell you, Casey, that you have been signed for two more years."

### NONCHALANT CASEY

"Thanks," Casey said, "now we were talking about the no-windup, wasn't it? When I come up to Kansas City Fatsio Flaherty hit me right in the stomach with it. 'I'd never played anything but high school baseball and you know how a batter lots of times gets up to the plate and adjusts his feet and leans over.' Casey got up and demonstrated a batter taking a comfortable stance."

"First thing I know the ball hit

me in the stomach. I was real mad. I was only 18 years old then. Then I learned never to take my eye off the ball. Of course they changed that by throwing out the quick pitch.

"It should help in warm weather," he continued, returning to the current no-windup situation without warning. "A pitcher won't get so tired as he won't go through all that windup motion. If you haven't got control you're in trouble."

**CHANGE OF SUBJECT**  
"Now our outfield is pretty good. Bauer is good out there in right field, and that feller in centre field, he broke three records. There may have been eight or 10 days when he was out there but shouldn't have been playing, but I used him all year."

"We had a little trouble in left field with Cerv, Howard, Noren and Seibera all hurt, which you seldom find on one club. I couldn't play Howard there because he couldn't throw because of an arm which he hurt running into a fence."

"I didn't know about signing a contract or anything when I came up here today. I know I've had enough baseball for awhile. Last year I was at my home in Glendale only 29 days, taking a trip around the world and to Japan after the season."

"George says we're willing to make deals. Now I'd say we'd be easier to deal with if we hadn't won the world series. We got quite a few prospects on our farm clubs, which I will look over at our school."

### Defending Intermediate Rugby Champs' Backs Against Wall

TORONTO (CP)—Peterborough Orfuns, last year's Dominion intermediate football champions, have their backs to the wall in defence of their title.

The Orfuns were beaten 21-8 at Hamilton Saturday in the first game of a two-game total points series for the intermediate Ontario Rugby Football Union title. Second game will be played at Peterborough next Saturday.

Orfuns aren't ready to concede

defeat, however, and hope for a repetition of last year's playoff against the same team. Beaten by 11 points at Hamilton in the opener of last year's final, Orfuns saw that deficit rise to 17 after an early Hamilton touchdown but went on to erase the margin and win the title.

**MEET QUEBEC CHAMPS**  
Winner of the Peterborough-Hamilton series will meet either Lakeshore Flyers or Verdun Bearcats who will decide the Quebec Rugby Football Union championship next Sunday. Flyers, who lost to Peterborough last year in the eastern final, won the first game of their two - game, total-points series 14-0.

The Quebec and Ontario champions will play in a sudden death game in Hamilton or Peterborough Nov. 3 and the winners will travel to Halifax Nov. 10 to meet the Maritimes champions, entering Dominion playoffs this year for the first time.

The Canadian final will be played at Victoria Nov. 17.

### Ban Spanish Javelin Throw From Olympics

LONDON (AP) — The International Amateur Athletic Federation Tuesday banned the Spanish discus-style of javelin throwing that was threatening to make a mockery of track and field in the forthcoming Olympic Games.

By using the twirling method of hurling the spear, unknown athletes were smashing the world record. Outstanding javelin throwers were achieving almost incredible distances.

Also, the new style carried with it the threat to life and limb. No one, especially the javelin thrower, had any idea where the spear would go.

So the council of the IAAF, which has jurisdiction over track and field rules, added a sentence to the javelin throwing regulations which said: "At no time after preparing to throw until the javelin has been discharged into the air may the competitor turn completely round so that his back is toward the throwing arc. This will come into effect forthwith."

### Soccer Players Threaten To Go On Strike

LONDON (CP) — Britain's professional soccer players today threatened strike action unless the Football League revamps its constitution to allow rapid settlement of disputes between players and management.

The strike threat is scheduled for discussion at Manchester today in a meeting between the league management committee and the Association Football Players and Trainers Union, which represents about 3,000 player-ay footballers in the country.

The union is asking that the management committee be empowered to make spot decisions concerning player - management disputes. At present, the committee can only forward recommendations to the league.

The union move arises out of the rejection by league clubs earlier this year of a number of management committee recommendations for increased minimum wages and bonuses for players.

### U. S. Aviation Leader Dies

BUFFALO (AP)—Lawrence D. Bell, 62, recognized as one of the leaders of the American aviation industry, died Saturday.

Death was attributed to a heart ailment.

The board chairman of the Bell Aircraft Corporation, which produced the world's fastest and highest-flying aircraft, founded the company in 1935. He served as president until last September when Leston P. Faneuf succeeded him.

Bell was born in Mentone, Ind. His first job in aviation was as a mechanic for two exhibition pilots when he was 18.

A year later, in 1915, he went to work for Glenn L. Martin. In 1917 Bell moved up to the position of vice-president and general manager with Martin.

### Three Groups Are Willing To Buy Toronto Argos

TORONTO (CP)—At least three groups are interested in buying the franchise of Toronto Argonauts of the Big Four Football Union, the Star says.

The Argonauts have not yet officially put the club up for sale. But, says The Star, Argo executives agree privately it's time they got out of football.

The paper adds that the Argos will have lost approximately \$125,000 in two seasons of operations. "That is a diet too rich for the (Argonaut) Rowing Club—which operates the franchise—to stand."

The story says the interested parties are not willing to disclose their identity. "However, it wouldn't be surprising if Eric Cradock, former owner of the Montreal Alouettes, is active in one of the syndicates. If this group gets the club, one problem is solved. Lew Hayman will be the general manager and Carl Voyles the coach."

Hayman is former general manager and part owner of the Alouettes and Voyles is a former coach of Hamilton Tiger Cats.

### Indian Army Can't Afford Olympic Wrestler's Appetite

NEW DELHI (AP) — India's leading entry for Olympic wrestling is a soldier with an appetite so large that even the Indian Army can't afford him.

He's Grenadier Havildar Lila Ram—or just "Lila" to his friends at the Grenadiers Regimental Training Centre.

Lila is one of the few Indian athletes given a chance to win a medal at the Melbourne Games. He has been the Indian heavy-weight wrestling champion for the last two years.

The grenadiers love Lila, who has brought fame to the regiment, and they all contribute to a special regimental fund to pay for his food. If they didn't Lila might starve.

An official army press release says that each day he consumes six quarts of milk, a pound of butter, a half-pound of almonds, a sizeable quantity of vegetables and between 45 to 60 "chapatties," a north Indian bread shaped like a pancake but bigger and heavier.

In addition, he goes through three to four pounds of meat and eggs every other day.

Despite his appetite, Lila, who is 25, has kept himself to a relatively trim 215 pounds by exercising daily.

### Condition Of 4 Ailing Stars Worrying Montreal Canadiens

MONTREAL (CP)—The condition of four ailing stars gave Montreal Canadiens worry as they prepared for tonight's National Hockey League game against New York Rangers.

Doctors said goalie Jacques Plante, taken to hospital for diagnosis of a fever, is suffering from an acute bronchial attack.

It was too early to say whether he will accompany the team when it leaves tonight for the New York game.

Maurice (Rocket) Richard and Boom Boom Geoffrion both have sore elbows. Richard's is a new injury while Geoffrion played last Saturday's game after having fluid removed from the injured arm.

It was not definitely known whether they will go to New York. Floyd Curry, with bruised ribs, also was a doubtful starter.

The club said it will take two forwards from Montreal Royals, including Guy Rousseau, to New York, and possibly Royal goalie Gerry McNeil.

### Charges Against Tabloids Dropped

MONTREAL (CP)—The city of Montreal has decided to withdraw charges laid several months ago against a number of tabloids and their publishers.

The tabloids and their publishers or distributors were charged with publishing and distributing obscene literature.

Mr. Justice Wilfrid Lazure in Superior Court Friday acceded to a city request that the charges be dropped.

### Ottawa To Be Represented In Grey Cup Float Parade

OTTAWA (CP)—After rejecting the idea for years, the capital's civic administration Tuesday decided to be represented for the first time by a float at the Grey Cup parade in Toronto, Nov. 24.

But it will not dip into city coffers for funds—unless a public campaign for funds doesn't cover the entire cost of the float.

Mayor Charlotte Whitton and four members of board of control kicked off the campaign by donating \$5 of their own money and appealing to Ottawans to give "anything from a dime to a dollar." The city's 18 aldermen likely will be asked to contribute a similar amount.

Mayor Whitton proposed a "dignified" float representative of Ottawa, the national capital and a special committee named by advice of the National Gallery's board of control plans to seek the

design centre and the trades department's exhibition branch for idea.

"We've been pickers all along about this thing," Controller Ernie Jones said in an interview. "So we finally decided it was time to get something done."
