MONDAY

RECEIVES SAD NEWS - Mrs. Edward Crosley, Bonshaw, received the sad news of the death of her brother, Russel Smith of Appleton, Idaho, who died in Orford, Idaho. The remains will arrive here late this week.

FUNERAL YESTERDAY - The funeral of the late Mrs. George Baker was held from the MacLean Funeral Home yesterday afternoon. The service was conducted by the Rev. W. T. Mercer. Interment was in the cemetery. The pallbearers were James Blaxland, Edgar Hawbolt, Albert Felbert, Charles Aldershot, Louis Drake and William MacGrath.

The Hollywood Citizen-News reports the recent death of Dr. H. MacArthur, Baptist Minister, and formerly of Prince Edward Island. At the time of his death Dr. MacArthur was pastor of the Eagle Rock Baptist Church in Hollywood, California, and was associated with his son, Dr. John F. MacArthur, in the gospel broadcast. Born in Summerside, P. E. I., Dr. MacArthur was educated at Prince of Wales College, later taking a doctorate in theology at Bob Jones University, Greenville, S. C. At the time of his death he held official positions in various Evangelical organizations as well as being a director of the Conservative Baptist Foreign Missionary Society. Surviving Dr. MacArthur are his widow Mrs. Olivia MacArthur and a daughter, Mrs. Margaret Turner of Glendale, California.

OTTAWA, March 12 - (CP) - Two law students from the University of British Columbia carried the 1950 Canadian University Debating Association Championship to the west coast Saturday night.

The students, Rodney Young and Alistair Fraser, won the judges' decision over Wilfred Driscoll and Mark McGuigan from St. Dunstan's University, Charlottetown.

The B.C. students debated the affirmative side of the resolution: "Resolved that communistic activity be made a criminal offence in Canada."

Mr. Young is the former C.C.F. member for Vancouver Centre in the House of Commons, while his partner, Mr. Fraser, campaigned for Defence Minister Brooke Claxton at Montreal in the general election last June.

Two of the three judges voted in favor of the B.C. team, while the third gave his decision to the Charlottetown entry.

The B.C. pair eliminated the entry of the Ontario Agriculture College, Guelph, in one semi-final round earlier Saturday, while St. Dunstan's disposed of the University of Ottawa in the other semi-final Friday.

The death occurred on Feb. 17, 1950, of Mrs. George Publicover a highly respected and dearly beloved citizen of North Rustico in her 75th year.

She leaves to mourn the following sons and daughters who will ever cherish her dear memory. Hedley and Peter Terlizzi and Nina, Mrs. Roy Oakley of Niagara Falls, who are the children of her first marriage. The second family are: Annie, Mrs. Ralph Haynes of Saint John; Rita, Mrs. Chesley Wood of Hunter River; Ruby, Mrs. George Pineau of North Rustico and Lloyd of Toronto. One son George predeceased her.

The funeral was held from her late home on February 20, 1950 and was largely attended.

The service was conducted by the Rev. Donald Nicholson, assisted by Rev. Mr. Gough. Mr. Nicholson spoke words of comfort to the bereaved and assembled people. He sang most effectively, a favorite of the departed "In The Garden". Other hymns and Psalms sung were "The Lord Is My Shepherd", "Safe In The Arms of Jesus" and "Unto the Hills".

The floral tributes were beautiful, bringing to the bereaved a certain comfort.

A man long prominent in the public life of this province, Mr. Edwin Dawson passed away in the Prince County Hospital on Novem-

ber 15, 1949. He was clerk of the Legislature of Prince Edward Island for sixteen years and taught in the public schools in this province previous to that for fifteen years. As a teacher his record was outstanding and he became so proficient as a clerk in the Legislature that the post of Assistant Clerk was abolished. The late Mr. Dawson carried all the full duties himself. He received special recognition as a public servant in 1935 when he was awarded a silver medal by King George V for long and meritorious services as clerk of the Legislature of P. E. I.

Besides his wife there are left to mourn, the following children: Harry of Augustine Cove, Godon, in California, Mary Eva wife of Redvers Hammill, Lower Freetown; Merrill and Margaret (Mrs. Dan Palmer) and George of Albany. One daughter Mrs. Sabina MacKenzie died in 1930 and her two children, George and Leslie were adopted by Mr. and Mrs. Dawson. He is also survived by two sisters Miss Ida Dawson and Mrs. W. J. Sullivan both of Summerside. Burial was in Seven Mile Bay Cemetery. The pallbearers were: Messrs. Bruce Campbell, Joe Murphy, Max Leturgy, George MacKay, George Sherry and James Murphy.

Mr. Jeremiah Gallant, a prominent and respected resident of Mont Carmel died in the Prince County Hospital, Summerside, on Thursday, February 23 at the age of 77 years. Mr. Gallant was in his usual good health when he suddenly developed a heart attack. Medical aid was summoned and it was decided to take him to the hospital the following day where he peacefully passed away after having been admitted only a few hours to that institution. He was visited by his pastor Rev. Father Buote, parish priest of Mont Carmel. Also Rev. Father Joseph LeClair of Summerside who administered the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church of which he was a faithful member.

His wife predeceased him by almost two years. He leaves to mourn and cherish his memory five sons and three daughters. The sons are Rev. Emmanuel Gallant, C.J.M. of Sacred Heart University, Balthus, N.B., Levi and Sylvain of New York City, Aubin and Ben at home. The daughters are, Mrs. Ovida Arsenault of Capreol, Mrs. Joseph Gallant of St. Nicholas and Mrs. Michael DesRoches of Tignish; one sister in the United States and one brother in Alberta; also many grandchildren.

A wide circle of relatives and friends heard with deep regret of the passing of Harry Ross, Albany, P. E. I., on February 23rd, 1950, at the age of forty-six years.

Mr. Ross was an elder and member of the choir of Albany United Church, and a well known farmer of the district. His devotion to the Church, neighbourliness, and constant good cheer will be much missed in the community.

A saw mill at Richmond, owned by Hudson Ramsay and valued at \$7,000, was completely destroyed yesterday morning by fire which broke out about eight o'clock. The building, 24 feet by 38 feet, burned to the ground within a half hour, along with about 4,000 feet of cut lumber. The loss is partially covered by insurance.

Mr. Ramsay was in the mill at the time when the gasoline engine back-fired and he was just about to get outside before the flames completely enveloped the building.

Some 25 men rushed to the scene but were unable to help. Mr. Ramsay had been operating this mill for the past three years. About fifteen months ago his brother, Wallace Ramsay, was killed when working in this mill when he was struck by a flying piece of equipment which suddenly broke loose.

The funeral service for the late Mrs. Mary Wallace was held from her late residence in Coleman on Wednesday, afternoon, March 8, with interment in Milo cemetery. Mrs. Wallace was in her ninety-fifth year and was a friend of all, a devoted and sincere Christian. Damage estimated at upwards of \$10,000 was caused in a farmhouse fire at Springfield late last night. The fire, which broke out at about 11.30, completely demolished the home of Mrs. Norris Sinclair.

Firemen from Kensington rushed to the scene but arrived too late to save the house. About five people were in the house at the time of the outbreak. Mrs. Sinclair and her two sons, Norman and James, were in bed. The two sons were sleeping in an upstairs bedroom, while Mrs. Sinclair was in a downstairs room. The sons rushed downstairs to the bedroom of their mother. James reached his mother first and managed to get her safely outside, while the second son, Norman, arriving in his mother's bedroom a few minutes later was trapped by flames and was forced to jump out by broken glass and was taken to a neighbor's house and a doctor was called in from Kensington.

OTTAWA, March 13 - (Special) - W. Chester S. McLure, Progressive Conservative member for Queen's, charged in the House of Commons tonight that the Government either through ignorance or design, withheld essential information on transport matters of prime importance to Prince Edward Island.

Speaking on the Throne Speech debate, Mr. McLure directed his fire on Transport Minister Chevrier, complaining that Mr. Chevrier had given inadequate replies to questions he had asked in the House on three matters. They were:

1. Plans of the Government or the Canadian National Railways to take over the Caribou-Wood Islands ferry system.
 2. Plans of the Canadian National Railways to take over bus-lines and trucking services on the highways on Prince Edward Island.
 3. Failure to state the Government policy on the proposed West Point ferry system.
- He pleaded with the Minister to secure more adequate information on issues of this kind from his officials and officials of the C.N.R. in order that the House of Commons would be correctly informed on them.

A flying ambulance made a mercy flight to South Rustico yesterday to pick up a woman injured in a fall and bring her to hospital in Charlottetown.

At the airport a Caudin ambulance was waiting to take her to the Charlottetown Hospital. The flight which occupied only a short time, was made about noon.

About a year ago, Mr. Sharpe made a flight to the same district to take Mr. Elmer Gallant's son to hospital here.
