Mr. John Nicholson, Crown prosecutor, appeared for the Crown with the appellant represented by Mr. Lester O'Donnell. He also represented Mrs. Rena Genge and Mr. P. A. Cheverie, both of this city, who are appealing convictions under the Temperance Act. Their appeals were heard, but no judgment was announced.

The appeal of Mrs. Mildred Ross against a conviction under the Temperance Act was set over to Thursday morning. Attorney for the appellant is Mr. J. O. Campbell, Q.C., who told the Court there was no evidence to be taken, it was purely a matter of legal argument.

Word has been received by Mr. Dan MacKinnon, of Charlottetown, that Mr. Albert E. MacKinnon of New York City had passed away as the result of a car accident in which he was involved during the latter part of April. The late Mr. MacKinnon was about 84 years of age. Only last summer the aged gentleman made the trip from New York for the special reason of seeing his Clan Ohietafin, Arthur Avallon MacKinnon, and it was during this time that he stayed at the home of Dan MacKinnon and visited with his clansmen in various parts of the Island. The late Mr. MacKinnon greatly impressed those with whom he came in contact with his wide knowledge of world affairs and his keen interest in the future of his country and Canada.

As a newspaperman with several of the largest American publications, he had travelled widely and was present at the Coronation of three British monarchs. Perhaps his greatest thrill came when he was chosen by the City of New York to present a plaque to the City of York, England.

Although born in Boston, Mr. MacKinnon claimed relationship to many of that name on Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia and took a special interest in tracing family connections. It was his firm resolve to visit the Island again this summer and the many friends that he made here will be saddened to hear that his life was cut short in such an untimely manner.
