By JOHN GALE LONDON (AP) — In a house which she shares with her younger daughter, Princess Margaret, arranging her collection of china and occasionally playing the piano, which she does competently. Sometimes she entertains old friends to tea or goes shopping in the London stores.

At weekends, she nearly always goes to Windsor. For longer breaks from home, she travels to one of her two estates in Scotland where her family, the Earls of Strathmore and Kinghorne, have had their roots for centuries.

Through the writer of activity, the Queen Mother has emerged as untroubled as ever. Some say hers is the smile that never wavers, and the wave that never wavers.

To 50,000,000 Britons, she is the visible symbol of happy family life at the palace level, a devoted mother and a dutiful grandparent.

CULTIVATED TASTES
The Queen Mother also has a variety of other energetic and cultivated tastes.

She was more than 50 years of age before friends introduced her to salmon fishing. Now she rarely visits Scotland without setting out in her waters, carrying a rod and reel for the rich salmon streams.

LET'S EAT Many Ways To Use Nuts—But They Add Calories

"Nuts belong in glamor meals," observed the Chef, indicating a row of canned nutmeats on the breakfast table. "Black and English walnuts, almonds, filberts, Brazil nuts, cashews, pecans, mix nuts," he said, counting them off, and added, "What deliciousness. What flavors are concentrated in these small kernels."

"There are so many ways of using them," continued the Chef, "For example, chopped fine and drifted over the frosting or whipped cream on a cake; chopped and strewn over a fruit or cheese salad; toasted and tossed over vegetables or chow mein; added to bread or rice stuffings; stirred into muffin batter; rolled into cookies, as a topping for fruit pies and puddings. Oh la la!"

ADDS CALORIES, TOO
"But remember, Chef," I said, "that whenever you add nuts to a food, they improve the flavor and nutritional value but increase the calorie count, too."

"For instance," in calories, 12 to 15 almonds weigh about 90; four average Brazil nuts, 97; six to eight cashews, 85; 10 to 12 filberts, 85; eight to 15 English walnuts, 88 and eight to 12 mixed nuts, 84.

"As an average, 25 per cent of these are protein calories; the fat content is high. So, in spite of their modest compactness, when nuts are added to a dish or served plain, they add considerable calories as well as nutritive value."
