TOURIST REGISTER PROVIDES ENTERTAINING COMMENTARIES

Life moments spent thumbing through visitors registers can prove highly entertaining, and reveal human nature at its most hurried.

In the case of the large register at the P.E.I. travel bureau in Charlottetown, a slight rebash of the Seven Years War takes place on two pages.

Example one: A visitor from Ottawa writes: "On ne parle pas beaucoup de Français". Directly beneath this a Montrealer has penned "When in Rome, do as the Romans do."

Example two: A separatist type who gives his address as "Republique du Quebec" writes exasperatedly: "Le mythe du bilinguisme". The answer appeared further down the page: "Thank God for a united Canada. Keep it united."

In Jesus Christ though never in any one of his MANY languages.

Most comments in the book lauded this "beautiful", "pretty", "marvellous" "paradise" island to the skies, but others had mild criticisms to make about such things as waiting for the ferry. One Massachusetts tourist who had spent the evening in Tormentum, remarked that "the Island is closed after 9:30 p.m."

A Texan who had spent three weeks in this country called the Island the "prettiest and economically best of Canada so far," and an Ontario woman said simply, "I like it, I like it."

But the line that really stings the local reader was "The natives are wonderful."



Heavy Traffic Toll In June

Figures released Friday by the provincial motor vehicle branch show that seven persons were killed and 66 injured in traffic accidents in the province during June.

The traffic toll was the heaviest of any month in the first six of this year, and June accounted for more traffic deaths than the first five months combined. From January to the end of May, five traffic deaths were recorded—three in February, one in March, and one in May.

In June of last year, four persons died on island highways. There were 111 traffic accidents to southeast 15 during the morning and shifting by evening to northwest 25. Low-high at New Glasgow and Goshen 9 and 68, Sydney 57 and 68, Charlottetown 62 and 65.
