THE PRINCESS ARRIVES.

The new steamer Princess, built by the Glasgow yard, De Kays Company, Grangemouth, Scotland, to the order of the Charlottetown Navigation Company, arrived here this morning and is now lying at the Company's wharf, where she has already been visited by a goodly number of people. The Princess is modelled somewhat on the lines of the Northumberland, but she is not as large as the latter steamer. Neither is she as large as the St. Lawrence, the steamer she is intended to replace.

The Princess is 165 feet long, 26 wide, and 18 feet 3 inches deep. She is 520 tons gross, and has an indicated horse power of 900. She attained a speed of 13 1/2 knots on her trial trip. The machinery of the Princess consists of triple expansion engines, steam windlass, screw gear and steam capstan aft. The steamer is fitted up with a large teak house forward, flying bridge situated on top part of the house, the latter to be used as a smoking room, with accommodation for captain and purser, and a mail room. There is a large teak house aft, with entrance to main saloon, the latter tastefully done up with oak and maple panels, and upholstered with morocco leather. The vessel has a large room between decks to carry cattle and dry goods. She is fitted with water ballast in a double bottomed tank and a double boiler. The latter is in fore and aft peaks.

The steamer sailed from Grangemouth Nov. 3, and the passage throughout was very rough. She behaved very well, however, and Captain Brown, who brought her to the harbor, is much pleased with her sea-going qualities. Mr. John A. Nicholson was first officer on the trip across, and William Collins second. Mr. McNair presided in the chief engineers department, and Mr. G. H. Clarke and Mr. Downey for first and second assistants, respectively. The Princess will be made ready for the Pictou-Charlottetown route with all possible despatch, and will probably begin work on the 10th inst. The captain and crew of the St. Lawrence will be transferred to her.

The Princess is certainly a splendid boat, and her appointments throughout are excellent. The Navigation Company is to be congratulated upon their purchase, and it is hoped that their investment will prove remunerative.

THE BEER QUESTION.

A Certiorari Applied for Yesterday and a Rule Granted. Yesterday an application was made to Mr. Justice Hodgson, the presiding judge at Chambers, for a rule for a certiorari to quash a conviction made by Stipendiary Magistrate Hazard against Thos. Clarke for selling contrary to the Carriage and Temple Act. Clarke was convicted upon evidence showing that he had sold "beer," and Mr. Stewart, Q. C., the counsel for Clarke, contended before the learned judge that a conviction could not be made upon such evidence unless it was affirmatively proved that the "beer" was intoxicating and that the evidence of its intoxicating nature must be clear and positive and not imaginary. In support of this contention he cited a number of decided cases under the Scott Act where distinguished judges in Ontario had so held. In Clarke's case the counsel argued that the evidence was that the beer "might be intoxicating" on other persons while the witnesses who gave this evidence positively stated it did so intoxicating him but on the contrary was "temperate beer." Mr. Justice Hodgson at the conclusion of Mr. Stewart's argument granted a rule nisi to quash the conviction, returnable before the full Court at 10 o'clock on Monday.

The London Times has rendered the cause of truth good service by publishing some statistics to show that Great Britain is not the only nation which is rapidly extending its territories by the absorption of savage areas. France has in twelve years increased her foreign colonial possessions from 665,000 to 3,391,000 square miles. Germany had no colonial territory twelve years ago; she has now 1,023,000 square miles. Italy has added in the same interval to her territory almost half a million square miles. During these twelve years Great Britain has brought under her influence 2,000,000 square miles in Africa, and has increased her total colonial territory from 3,400,000 to 11,000,000. There is this great difference, however, between Britain and the other nations as promoters of colonization: they exploit their colonies for their exclusive benefit so far as they can; she allows all foreign countries to trade with her colonies on the same footing as she herself. The splendid courage which prompts such a course ought to appeal to the admiration of civilized people everywhere, but it does not always seem to have that effect.

THE GOVERNMENT'S INJUSTICE.

Sir.—The inhabitants of Lots 23 and 24 are again to be disappointed in having a road machine for next spring, so that the roads could be repaired early in May. The machine that was in the district since the first of July last, has been ordered away to Mr. Peters' district, and that part that is under supervision Crockett. We were led to believe that this machine was to be left in this district, and were in hope that our roads would be repaired as soon as the snow was away, so that we would not be compelled to travel through holes and ruts all spring and sand and dust all summer. Quite a number of owners in this section were in the habit of repairing the roads as soon as the snow was away before the introduction of the road machines, so that we had good roads all summer and fall. Since the machines have been in operation our roads are not repaired till July and August, much to the worry of man and beast. To remedy this grievance, application was made to our representatives, Messrs. Farquharson and Wise and the Commissioner of Public Works for a machine for this district. There was one coming on trial, if it proved satisfactory this district that had made application for one. The machine was bought by the Government, but strange to say, it was sent to Mr. Peters' district and our first claim overlooked. This spring several new machines were got by the Government and sent to other districts, and allowed to remain idle until the middle of June before they were put to work. If one had been sent to this district, almost all the roads could have been repaired in time, and the fact that we have had good roads all summer and fall.

Whoever fault is it that this district is treated in this manner? Mr. Farquharson throws the blame on the supervisor. In best of us to differ with him. I think that our representatives are the only ones to blame, especially Mr. Farquharson, as he is a member of the government and ought to have a say where those machines should be sent. Have our representatives anything to say in such matters, or have they any influence with the Government?
