HALIFAX TOURNAMENT

Closing Sports and Proceedings.

ISLANDERS TO THE FRONT.

The torchlight procession last night was the grandest affair ever seen here, the men making a gorgeous display.

The firemen's sports were not so largely attended yesterday as on previous days.

In the tug-of-war Halifax defeated Truro, and Charlottetown defeated Portland, N. B.

Daniel J. McDonald, Captain of the Ch'town Salvage team won first prize of \$25 in the 100 yard flat race.

Eighteen started in the quarter mile flat race which was won by Frye, of Bangor, Me., who is supposed to be some crack American sprinter.

In the 100 yard flat race, open to Hook and Ladder men only, the first prize \$25 was won by Charles Stewart, of the Charlottetown Team.

The Dartmouth Team won the 300 yard Hose-Race, with Truro second.

Frye, of Bangor, won first money \$30 in the half-mile flat race, with Lovett, of Yarmouth, second.

The consolation race, distance a quarter-mile, open to all competitors who had taken no place in any of the events, was won by Condon, of Halifax.

BRITISH AFFAIRS.

Important Speech by Salisbury.

HIS POLICY RESPECTING IRELAND.

LONDON, Aug. 13. Lord Salisbury made an important speech at the Lord Mayor's dinner last evening.

In referring to Ireland he said that it was the duty of the Government to devote its whole energies to free the loyal people from all constraint exercised upon them.

The question of an independent government in Ireland after thorough discussion by our most powerful statesmen, has been emphatically rejected by an enormous majority of the people of the Kingdom.

I believe that our opponents will eventually admit that this is England's final decision of the question.

It is our duty to restore in Ireland that social order, the loss of which is the only just cause of its discontent.

I am convinced that in pursuing such a policy we shall find the strongest support of the people.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Aug. 13. A terrible triple tragedy took place near here yesterday.

The Rev. F. M. Bandy and John Davis, a prominent farmer had some difficulty over Davis' attentions to Bandy's daughter.

The young woman's brother attempted to whip Davis, when the latter beat him to death, crushing in his skull with a stone.

The reverend gentleman then drew a knife and attacked Davis. They fought with knives until both were mortally wounded.

Bandy is dead and Davis will die.

AN Orange Procession—the Usual Result. LONDON, Aug. 13.

Whilst an Orange procession was passing through the streets yesterday, two bottles filled with gunpowder with a lighted fuse attached were thrown into the ranks.

The fire in the fuse was extinguished before an explosion could take place.

The Orange-men were also attacked and several prominent people were injured.

ALL Quiet in Belfast. BELFAST, IRE., Aug. 13.

All is still quiet here but people look with dread to the withdrawal of the military.

The Roman Catholic bishop of Belfast has prohibited any Catholic processions during the remainder of the year.

CANADIANS at Shoeburyness. MONTREAL, Aug. 13.

At Shoeburyness the Canadian team won fourth prize in the 10-inch competition; first prize in the 64-pounder-gun shooting for the Londonderry Cup.

ANOTHER Drowning Accident. BOSTON, Aug. 13.

Two small coasting schooners were captured by a squall in the harbor yesterday and seven men are supposed to have been drowned.
