OTTAWA, April 24.—(Special)—Tenders are being called by the Public Works Department today for repairs to the original wharf at Cape Tormentine. Total cost of the repair project is estimated at \$60,000. The wharf under repair is not part of the car ferry terminals at Tormentine but the old wharf built before the turn of the century. It suffered heavy damage from being over-loaded with building materials at the time of construction of the ferry terminals and is now unsuitable and hazardous for the fishermen of West-
