A CABLEGRAM from London reports that the brig, Zerkle, Capt. Kichham, from Fernandina to Demerara with a cargo of pitch pine, became waterlogged and was abandoned at sea. The crew were saved. The Zerkle was owned by Peake Bros., and was built at Mt. Stewart four or five years ago. The ship was partly insured.

ACCORDING to the Transcript Monday evening's meeting of the Moncton Town Council was an exceedingly stormy one. Mayor Mackenzie and Councillor Lea had a sharp set-to, the former threatening to have the latter expelled for using improper language. Councillor Lea vigorously denied using any improper language and the expulsion was declared "off."

The concert in Souris court house on Tuesday evening, notwithstanding the unfavorable weather, was well patronized. One of the chief attractions of the evening was the presence of the Souris brass band. Under the tuition of Mr. Worth of this city, this band is reported as learning fast, and in a short time will be quite proficient in the art that has power to soothe the breast made savage through listening long to the notes of aw beginners. The Toronto World says: "Harry Lindley, the well-known theatrical man, died in New York on Wednesday from injuries received by a fall. Lindley was well known throughout Canada, having visited, professionally, almost every city, town and village." The London, Ont., correspondent of the Globe, however, says: "The report which has been widely circulated that Harry Lindley, the comedian, died last week in New York, appears to be without foundation, as his relatives in this city received a letter from him to-day, written from Peterboro, where Harry is alive and well."

H. M. WARSHIP WIANGLER is at present at Souris, having arrived there from Halifax on Monday. She has been stationed on the coast of Africa for the last two years, and will remain on this coast during the present month of October, after which she will spend the winter at the West Indies. Since arriving at Souris, some of her crew have been trying their hand at target practice with a gatling gun. The sea was rather rough for the practice, but did not prevent the balls from falling thick and fast all around the target. Whether it was struck or not is not known, but if their gatling missed the mark as often as Howard's gatling missed the redskins in the Northwest rebellion, there are not many bullet holes in it.

A SOURIS correspondent writes: "The S. S. Miranda called here on Monday and took on board 500 barrels bulk of sundries, consisting of muskels, potatoes, oats, hides, etc., which were shipped by Souris merchants. The Miranda, it is understood, will call here fortnightly for the rest of the season. If rates were as low and as favorable as they might be made, the railway would be more patronized than steamers by business men. Within the last half dozen years there has been an increase of nearly fifty per cent in the water-borne carrying trade of the country. Railways are made for the people, and not the people for the railways; and when they have to compete, as in this Island, with water-borne freights, their tariffs should be framed to suit the circumstances of the country. Unless this be done, their transport business, though great, will fall far short of what it might be made under lower and more reasonable tariffs."

IRISH AFFAIRS.

The Mitchellstown Shooting.

A Verdict of Murder.

To Suppress the League.

CAPTAIN HAMILTON CONVICTED.

LONDON, Oct. 12.

During the proceedings to-day at the inquest in the Mitchellstown shooting case, attention was drawn to the fact that the policemen charged with the shooting had been removed from the district on the eve of the jury's verdict. The police inspector said that the men had been removed because their duties in the place had ceased, but they would return if necessary.

The coroner declared that the removal of the police was illegal, improper and inconsistent.

After all the evidence had been submitted, Mr. Harrington, who appeared against the men charged with the shooting, asked that a verdict of wilful murder be returned against head constable Brownrigg and five policemen who fired under his general orders.

Mr. Harrington accused Constable Brownrigg of deliberately planning murder. The jury returned a verdict of murder against Inspector Brownrigg, Sergeants Kirwan, Ryder and Brennan.

The coroner has issued warrants for the arrest of the men found guilty.

The Daily News Dublin correspondent telegraphs that he has received information from an influential quarter that the Government will within a fortnight totally suppress the League. The Nationalists, he says, are prepared for any such emergency.

DUBLIN, Oct. 12.

The inquest in the case of John Kinsella, the old man shot and killed by emergency men in the estate of Mr. Brooke, at Coolgreany County, Wexford, September 28, resulted in a verdict of murder against Capt. Hamilton.

A Murderer Confesses.

DEXTER, Me., Oct. 12.

Nine years ago the bank here was robbed and Cashier Barren was found dead, bound and gagged in the vault. The affair created a great sensation, and it was generally believed since that Barron robbed the bank and committed suicide. To-day David L. Stair was arrested at Franklin, Mass., for his murder. His son has confessed and told how a gang, led by his father, planned and executed the robbery, and murdered Barron.

What Sir Charles Will Do.

MONTEAL, Oct. 12.

Sir Charles Tupper passed through the city to-day on his way to Ottawa. He said his intention is to stand again for the seat. He was, however, in the hands of the Prime Minister, and it was impossible to definitely say what he would do.

Officially Contradicted.

LONDON, Oct. 12.

The Russian Government officially contradicts the report that the Grand Duke Nicholas in a recent speech declared that under certain circumstances he and other Russians would join the French army.

Fire on Shipboard.

SAVANNAH, Ga., Oct. 12.

Fire broke out this morning in the cargo of the British steamer Hugh London, loading for Liverpool, and is burning fiercely. The vessel has 40,000 bales of cotton on board.

LONDON, Oct. 12.

Snow storms, accompanied by thunder and lightning, have prevailed in England and Wales. The roads in Wales are blocked with snow.
