

Nats Top Bosox 7-4; Yanks Blank Orioles

Washington Senators outlasted Boston Red Sox in Fenway Park Tuesday winning 7-4. The big blow was Harmon Killebrew's 39th home run of the season for the visiting Nats.

Killebrew's clout, which came with bases empty in the seventh inning tied him with Cleveland's Rocky Colavito for the American League lead in that department.

The Red Sox, who outbit the visitors 13-8, were plagued by bases on balls. Three Boston pitchers allowed 11, with starter and loser Earl Wilson giving up eight in three and a third inning. His record is now 1-1.

Relief pitcher Truman Cleveland saved the win for Camillo Pascual, now 13-10.

Ace Armstrong Risks Victory Streak Tonight

CAMDEN, N. J. (AP)—Sixth-ranked Ace Armstrong risks a 17-bout victory streak here tonight when he meets British Empire champion Dick Tiger in a 10-round middleweight fight.

Armstrong, who hailed from Elizabeth, N.J., hasn't lost a professional fight since he started his career in 1955.

Tiger, born in Nigeria, has caused quite a bit of controversy since his arrival earlier this year.

His two fights in this country were with Rory Calhoun and neither decision was popular. They drew in their first meeting June 5, but the Nigerian lost the much disputed rematch. Tiger has a lifetime record of 23-8-2.

The roan gelding that performed so brilliantly over the Charlottetown track has been disappointing in both his Halifax starts. On Saturday August 22 he was 3-5 in the big feature and Monday night he romped home fourth in the first tripe and sixth in the second mile.

All these great pacers are scheduled to go again tomorrow at Truro and then return to Halifax for another get-together on Monday, Labor Day, afternoon.

NATURALLY Island racing fans are feeling a bit blue at the recent showings of their favourite, Mighty Lee looked terrific in his performances here and there were high hopes that he would lead the parade just about every time out on other tracks in the Maritimes. George Callbeck had reined the Mighty Lee to victory every time he stepped on the track at Charlottetown and his performances that afternoon at the visit of Her Majesty will long be remembered by Island racing fans.

However since leaving the Island a couple of weeks ago, Mighty Lee has done no better than third and this was a far cry from what race fans here expected of him.

HOWEVER, tomorrow the roan gets another chance when these speedsters go at Truro raceway. Despite his performances these last two times out, folks here on the Island will be looking for him to head the parade in the Nova Scotia railway town. He was entitled to a couple of "off-night" showings. These showings can't make us forget the spectacular displays he put on for us at Charlottetown Driving Park. No horse has come close to that 2:03.4 mile of his on July 30. It still is and will likely remain for a long time to come the fastest mile in the Maritimes.

IF THIS big invasion pace comes off here on Saturday September 12 and the cream of these big pacers perform, folks around these parts will still be picking their horse, Mighty Lee, to get home a winner. We realize that this would be a big order. It's big because we are not aware of the abilities of the other top horses and these abilities are something to really make you stop and think.

Francis Breaud's Convoir has indeed been the comeback horse of the year. Away to a poor start it looked for a spell that this great and popular pacer was in for a rough season. He looked anything like the Convoir of old when he raced against Mighty Lee here in June.

But things turned out fine for Mr. Breaud. Convoir was back at the racing wars soon after that and he was showing the stuff that made him the most respected horse in the seaside provinces for the past few years.

Mr. Breaud has signified his intention of shipping his great pacer to Charlottetown if the feature pace comes off here September 12. The Moncton druggist would certainly like to have Convoir come through before Charlottetown fans. And the way he has been going of late, chances are he will leave the wire as the favourite. When Convoir is right, he's the toughest kind of a horse to beat and there's every indication that he is 100 per cent right at the present time.

Raise fans throughout the Maritimes are certainly pleased that Convoir has made the great comeback. Folks around here were mighty sorry when it looked for a spell that his 1959 campaign would be a short one. Those fears are all dispelled now and Convoir once more is the terror of the racing ovals in the Maritimes.

Island racing fans would surely love to see him perform once again over the Charlottetown speedway. And the chances are good that they will.

Let's keep our fingers crossed.
