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Strange But True

One of the scenic miracles of Siberia is Lake Baikal, 6,000 feet deep and as large as Switzerland. So crystal clear is the water of this amazing lake that small stones can be seen on the bottom. Russia has the longest rail line in the world, 47,000 miles in Siberia, stretching from Vladivostok to the Urals, and another 1,000 miles in European Russia — 5,700 miles in all.

Here's a typical example of the road signs the traveler runs across in many parts of Asia. You are entering Amur Sang. This town has 40 homes, 200 females, 160 males, 6 soldiers, 2 officers, 400 horses, 300 cattle, with about 270 acres of land under cultivation. If you would see the greatest animal parade on earth then go to the Dark Continent or, to be more specific, go to a bottleneck pass in Tanganyika. At certain times of the year a mighty army of animals migrate through this pass, their estimated number at no less than ten million.

Photographs taken of the closely packed herds at this point, make a fascinating study. Leading the ten mile wide and thirty mile long procession was a herd of zebras, followed by a great army of gnus. Behind these followed a mixture of big game! Photographer and author Martin Johnson, who took pictures of the animals for the movies, tells us it took the herds days to pass through the narrow defile.

One of the oldest cities in Mexico, Guanajuato, has a street named, The Street of the Kiss. This should make an ideal place for a honeymoon. A good deal of superstition still exists among sea-faring nations, and most sailors have a particular aversion to weighing anchor on a Friday.

"The dirtier one's boat, the better the fishing," is a superstition of long standing among some fisher folk. The fishermen of the Atlantic Islands believe that by putting a little seaweed into their boots on June 24, they will have a profitable season. Another superstition peculiar to the people of the Atlantic Islands is that certain animals must not be referred to by their proper names while at sea. In Faeroe boats a cat becomes "short nose". A cow, Kugu to the farmer, is langhola to the fisherman. When you eat a boiled egg at sea care must be taken to crush the empty shell or a ship will be lost at sea. Smoke is called vesa, and fishermen speak of the seal as the munnaeiski. Indeed it would take a good sized book to record all the superstitions found among sailors the world over.

Tinoo Tib, the notorious trader of Zanzibar Island, actually rendered valuable assistance to H.M. Stanley in his explorations of Africa. When Tinoo died, he left behind him 300 wives.

On the site of the old slave market is an Anglican Church, whose altar was built above the old whipping post. Above the pulpit may be seen a crucifix made from the tree under which was buried, in 1873, the heart of Doctor David Livingstone, the man who gave his life in order that the Dark Continent might have light.

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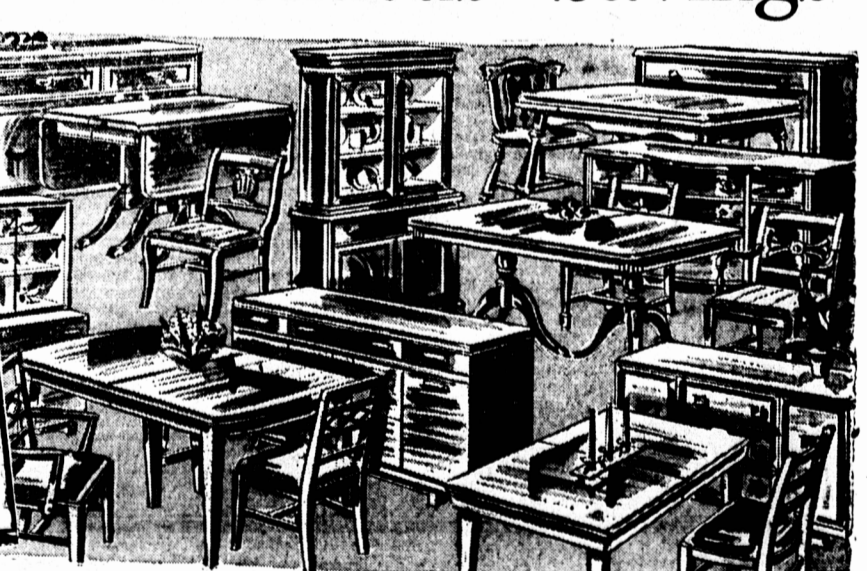
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
