FIRE.—Shortly before ten o'clock last evening, the alarm sounded for a blaze in the stable of Mr. E. Cameron, situated in the rear of his premises on Kent Street. The fire started among the straw in the loft, and before it could be extinguished the stable was pretty badly damaged. It is not known how the fire started, but it is thought to have been the work of an incendiary. The loss, we understand, is covered by insurance.

FOUND DEAD.—The lifeless body of Thomas Guilfoyle, a butcher in the employ of Blake Bros., was found on the sidewalk on King Street, in front of the residence of the senior member of the firm, at an early hour this morning. Guilfoyle boarded with Mr. Blake. He was working as usual yesterday, and appeared to be in good health and spirits. Last evening, after his day's work, he dressed himself and went out. Shortly after ten he returned, and went upstairs to his room. Nothing further was heard of him until this morning, when his body was found on the sidewalk, directly under his bedroom window, lying in a pool of blood. When found the unfortunate man had on his white shirt, drawers and socks. The supposition is that he took a weak turn, and leaning out of the window overbalanced himself and fell to the ground. Guilfoyle, who was about 38 years of age, has been in the employ of the Messrs. Blake since he came from Ireland 15 years ago. He was a sober, inoffensive young man, and was a great favorite with his employers and all who knew him. He was to have been married shortly. An inquest will be held this evening at 8 o'clock.

Seven Aldermen Arrested.

BIDDEFORD, Aug. 27. A sensation was created this morning when United States Marshal Sander, of Portland, placed under arrest the seven aldermen of Biddeford and took them to Portland with several persons detained, as witnesses, on warrants from the United States District Court. The aldermen are charged with neglecting to strike from the Biddeford voting list the names of parties not legally entitled to vote, and for conspiracy in arranging to place upon the lists the names of persons not legal voters. This action is a culmination of recent naturalization troubles in Biddeford.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Aug. 27. Sir John Thompson returned to Ottawa to-day, looking greatly improved in health by his ocean trip. He declines to make any statement yet regarding his official mission. In reference to Newfoundland matters he says the delegates have done good work, but it is too soon to predict the exact form of settlement which will be adopted. There appears to be serious obstacles in the way of effecting a purchase of the French claims.

The Ulunda Ashore.

DIGBY, N. S., Aug. 27. The steamer Ulunda struck on Cow Ledge, at the entrance of grand passage on the fire, posts side during a thick fog, at 11 o'clock last night. The bottom is gone from the bow to amidships, and water flows in and out of the forward compartment. The engine room is dry and the after part of the ship floods at high water. She will in all probability prove a total loss.

The Crops in Ireland.

LONDON, Aug. 27. The Irish Land Commission, reporting on the condition of the crops in Ireland, states that the oat crop generally is in good condition; but the potatoes, with a very few exceptions, are in a very poor condition.
