

# Leadership Course Planned For 4-H'ers

A 4-H Junior leadership course will be held on the campus of St. Dunstan's University next week with the registration on the afternoon of Monday, August 9 and the closing dinner on Thursday evening.

The 4-H Club members will be welcomed to the campus by Right Rev. George MacDonald, University rector on Monday evening.

Tuesday morning David Rogers, organizer of the course, will discuss the question "What is 4-H?" Mr. Rogers is director of extension, P.E.I. department of agriculture.

## COUNSEL SUBJECTS

One of the more important parts of the course comes before noon with a panel of people discussing career possibilities with the 4-H'ers.

Chairman for the girls panel is Patricia Peters. Counselling will include secretary, public health, hairdressing, home economics, laboratory technician.

John Chandler, P.E.I. department agriculture is chairman of the panel for boys. Cpl. Robert Williams will counsel on RCMP, Wallace Wood, Marshall, will advise on farming, Malcolm MacDonald on trades, George Wright on agriculture and Alexander Campbell, Summerside, on professions.

Enid Coles will meet the group later in the forenoon to discuss

"how to conduct yourself in an interview."

Rev. Adrian Arsenault will discuss speaking in public. Dr. Jean MacKay will speak on "decision making." Patricia Peters talks on nutrition for teenagers. Wednesday evening will be given over to a discussion of recreational programs.

Three speakers are slated for Wednesday forenoon; Rev. Dr. F. W. Bolger, S.D.U. will speak on "P.E.I. and Confederation." Neil A. Matheson of the Guardian-Patriot will discuss "Community history" and Dr. Frank MacKinnon, P.W.C. will speak on "The Parliamentary Process."

The afternoon includes a tour of the legislative building and the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Complex. "Talent Night" is set for the evening hours.

John Martin discusses "parliamentary procedure" on Thursday morning; Rudi Dalenbach talks on "What is leadership" and Rev. Allan MacDonald will also be heard.

4-H awards will take over in the afternoon session and new 4-H projects will be discussed, followed by an evaluation of the course. Those participating in the discussions include Roger Younker, Marcia Dixon, Cecil Taylor and Mervyn McNally.

# Northumberland Ferries Report Major Increases

An increase during July of 6,960 passengers and 2,265 automobiles over the same period last year has been reported by Northumberland Ferries Ltd. Last month, 70,966 passengers, 21,794 cars and 2,641 trucks travelled on the Wood Islands-Caribou ferry run, as compared with 63,946 passengers, 19,529 cars and 2,167 trucks in July, 1964.

Increase for the May to July period this year was 4,355 passengers, 1,326 cars and 462 trucks.

# Scottish Festival Underway Today

The rich and colorful tradition of the Scottish Highlands will come alive this weekend when the Scottish Festival, one of Prince Edward Island's biggest tourist attractions, gets underway today at 4 p.m. at the Highland College in North Rustico.

Pipe bands, the world's champion highland dancer, Gaelic singing and other features are part of the 15-day festival program. This is the fifth year this big musical event has been staged on the huge outdoor playground. In the event of rain, the concerts are presented in the recreation hall.

Some 40 students are enrolled for classes at the Highland College this year and once again the dance instructor is Sandra Bald Jones of Fifehire, Scotland, 1962 adult world champion Highland dancer. Piping instructor is Pipe Major George A. Fraser of Charlottetown, pipe major of the resident band, The Lovat Scots, and also pipe major of the Dartmouth, N.S. Legion Pipe Band.

Daily concerts are presented at 7.30 p.m. every weekday night and also on Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday afternoons at 4 p.m. from today through and including August 22. Students are enrolled from the Maritimes, Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba. The annual summer school is operated by the Highland College of Prince Edward Island and under auspices of the Prince Edward Island Tourist Association.

Immediately following the North Rustico performance the Scottish Festival will move to the United States resort area of Bar Harbor, Maine, for a one-week appearance. This portion of the festival is under auspices of the Bar Harbor Chamber of Commerce.

# First Year Student Militia Will Be Inspected Today

Lt. Col Leo F. MacDonald, honorary colonel of 5 Signal Regiment, will inspect 36 first year student militia candidates from the Charlottetown area today at 10 a.m.

The full-dress inspection formally concludes five weeks of intensive military training for the candidates.

The student militia training program was inaugurated three years ago to provide future officers and NCO's for the militia in Canada. Candidates are selected on the basis of their academic standing and personal suitability, and are taken through several phases of training, which includes local courses during summer and winter and attendance at summer camps.

This summer's program has been administered by 5 Signal Regiment. Officer commanding the course is Capt. J. Bernard Connolly. Instructors included Cpl. H. Koenig, of the "I" staff, and four NCO's from local militia units: Sgt. Wilfred Smith, and Cpls. David Blanchard, Kenneth Foley and Gerry Blanchard.

The funeral was held from St. Peter's Cathedral, Charlottetown.

# Nine Islanders In Final Shoot

CONNAUGHT RANGES, SOUTH MARCH, ONT. — The final stage of the Governor-General's match today at the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association prize meet will see nine Island marksmen taking part.

A total of 24 marksmen comprised the team representing this province in the meet which began Monday.

The qualifying stage, the Letson Match, fired Thursday from 200, 500 and 600 yard ranges was won by Lt. Gerry Oullette of Montreal who registered a possible 105 points firing under tricky wind and mirage conditions.

Top marksman among the Islanders was Tpr. Ronnie Clark of Charlottetown with a score of 101. He was followed by Lt. Al Match 100, Tpr. E. Jones, WO2 Mike Susick, Tpr. Eldon MacLean, Tpr. Ray Vessey, and Lt. Ralph Jenkins each with 99, Lt. Mary MacLennan Lea 97, Capt. Roy McCabe 98 and Cdt. S. MacDonald 96.

The final stage of this match is fired from the 300, 600 and 900 yard ranges starting early today.

In the Jubilee Cup team match fired in conjunction with the Letson match, the eight-man Island squad finished with a score of 784 out of 840 points to capture second place behind Manitoba who squeezed the victory by a one point margin.

Individual scores of the Islanders were: Tpr. Clark 101, WO2 Susick, Eldon MacLean, Lt. Jenkins and Tpr. E. Jones, each with 99, Tpr. Bob Barwise and Cdt. Scott MacDonald each with 96, and Sgt. L. Phaneuf 95.

At the end of four days shooting for positions in the Grand Aggregate, by Thursday night Mike Susick was out in front with 547, out of 590 points. He was followed by Lt. Jenkins; 545, Tpr. E. Jones 537, Tpr. Clark 536, Tpr. MacLean and Tpr. Barwise each with 532, Lt. George Rogers 531, Capt. McCabe 529 and Tpr. Harold Jones 527.

The department of forestry fire truck at Alberton was called out yesterday to a fire at Glenwood on grassland property owned by Elbert Betts.

The O'Leary Fire Department poured 2,000 gallons of water in efforts to control the blaze and an additional 1,200 gallons was used by the forestry truck.

Although still burning last evening the blaze was being circled by a highway department bulldozer and was believed under control.

The previous day a grassland fire at Port Hill was successfully controlled by local residents and was practically out when the forestry truck arrived from Alberton.

Believed to have started from burning garbage the fire was on property owned by Joseph Gillis.

Heavy smoke from all these fires was noticed as far east as Montague and at times was particularly heavy over Charlottetown.

Smoke in the Alberton area Thursday night was attributed by some to New Brunswick fires.

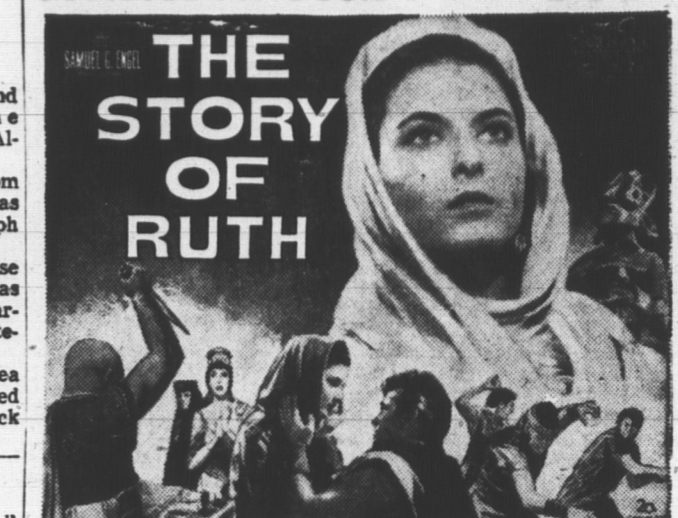
