THE Governor General and the Princess Louise were recently presented with an Address by the Town Council of Chester. Having expressed satisfaction at the safe arrival of the Governor-General, the Address proceeded:—"We respectfully beg to express our great satisfaction that the heir of the proud titles of Campbell and McCallum More, and the consort of a daughter of our beloved Queen, should have been called on to fill the distinguished position of Governor-General of the great and important Dominion of Canada, and our sincere appreciation of the devotion your Excellency has shown to the duties of that high trust—duties which we believe your Excellency has discharged with eminent success, and to the general approval of Her Majesty's subjects—who have watched with interest and admiration the successful tour just completed by your Excellency through this hitherto less-frequented part of that great country."

The Quebec Elections.

A Quebec despatch says:—"The great Conservative victory is the all-absorbing topic of conversation throughout the city. The Opposition never anticipated such an overwhelming defeat, and they felt keenly its crushing effect. Old time Liberals attribute the failure to want of organization and disunion."

Chili and Peru.

THE New York World says that it is understood that the United States Government will insist upon the conclusion of early peace between Chili and Peru without the dismemberment of the latter. Commissioners have left Washington to enquire into the existing difficulties; and it is understood the action of the United States Minister at Peru will be sustained. The United States will take credit for trying to teach the victorious Chilians moderation.

Current Bank Notes.

A gentleman in St. John, says the Globe, has received from an official in the Union Bank of P. E. I., Charlottetown, a letter which states that new accounts are now pouring in upon the Bank, and that all the Dominion Government business for the Island has been transferred to them. He further writes, "it is extraordinary to say we have not lost \$100 in specie since the 'Bank of P. E. I. suspended.' The writer also states that the Union Bank will, ultimately, probably be much benefited by this suspension."

The Halifax Herald says: In reference to the paragraph copied from the St. John News, referring to the Cashier of the Bank of Prince Edward Island, we are authorized to say that the assertions of his living above his means are altogether incorrect. Whatever mistakes the Cashier may have made, there is no charge against him of persona defalcation.

DEAR SIR.—A colored seaman arrived at this station to night from the Western train with both feet frozen so bad that he is unable to stand upon them, or help himself in any way. He hails from Cuba. I find that the Spanish Consul and the Deputy Minister of Marine are both away. I have, therefore, to apply to you for an order to have him removed to the Marine Hospital, as I learn you have connection with that institution.

Any necessary funds for his care for a time (until the proper authorities may be able to take the case in hand) will be borne by private subscription from the railway employes. Yours truly, (Signed) G. A. SHARPE. (COPY.) MONDAY EVEN'G.

DEAR MR. SHARPE.—With reference to the subject of your letter I am sorry to have to say that I have no power whatever to let the man in the Marine Hospital as the case now stands. My orders are expressed to await a certificate from the Customs Collector.

I advise you to apply there, and if Mr. Currie or his deputy should direct me, I will let him in—not otherwise. DEAR SIR.—Mr. Chappelle has placed in my hands your letter of last evening in reply to his application for the admission of a sailor (whose feet are frozen) into the Marine Hospital, and in which you refer him to the Collector of Customs for a certificate. I have this morning waited upon Mr. Currie, who declines to assume any responsibility, and in the meantime the patient is at the Railway Station without medical attendance. I have therefore taken the liberty of sending him to the Marine Hospital, in the hope that my action will have your approval, and that you will give what medical or surgical attendance may be required, and pending instructions from the Minister of Marine and Fisheries at Ottawa, with whom I shall communicate. I will be responsible for expenses that may be incurred.

Sir,—The Marine Hospital of which I am the surgeon, and not the governing authority, is a Dominion Institution.

The duties in regard to the Hospital are defined and laid down on paper, and sent to me from the Dominion Government. On looking carefully over them, I do not discover that I am required to receive any instructions from the civic authorities.

P. S.—I had you have telegraphed to Ottawa for permission. I will wait for an answer from 24 to 48 hours.

Yours, etc., ON TIME.

A Vienna correspondent says the recent statement of Prince Bismarck that Italy within the last twenty years had advanced so far towards a republic that there was no saying how things would end, has created much sensation there. It is considered to imply that he does not regard Italy as a fitting ally.

THERE has been an immense falling off in the export of butter and cheese from the United States. Last year the exports averaged of cheese 2,000,000 pounds per week; of butter 500,000 pounds per week. This year the week export is not more than 1,000,000 pounds of cheese and 200,000 pounds of butter. The reasons given for this decline are that the English production has, thanks to the wet season, been greater, and the American production, thanks to the drouth, small or increased consumption on this side also has much to do with it. It is also the case that large exports of oleomargarine and 'lard cheese' in the name of butter and real cheese have damaged the reputation of American goods. Canadian cheese exporters cannot be too careful of the good name their produce now holds.

THE Pioneer Beet Root Sugar Company, of Coaticook forwarded on the 5th the first barrel of beet root sugar manufactured in Canada to the Minister of Agriculture at Quebec. The sugar was forwarded under the official seal being affixed in the presence of the municipal authorities. This was done to secure the subsidy of \$7,000 per annum for ten years guaranteed by the Provincial Government to the first factory in the Province in operation. The sample, although from the first 'jet' made, was nearly a pure white, although containing the impurities of the pipes. A similar barrel was sent Alderman Hagar, the President of the Company.

A correspondent in Ottawa writes: "A prominent public man, a life-long resident of Nova Scotia, and at one time a strong opponent of Confederation, informs me that under the N. P. his province is flourishing and prospering most wonderfully. He says that Nova Scotia was never so well off as she is to day, and he feels confident that if a general election were to take place tomorrow the result would be almost as great a victory for the Conservative party as was the victory in Quebec on Friday last."

Another disaster, involving serious loss of life and great damage to property, has occurred at Minneapolis. Four large flour mills and one cotton mill were destroyed by fire on the 6th involving a total loss of \$416,000, on which there is an insurance of \$207,000. An explosion in one of the mills caused the loss of five, and probably more lives.

Dynamite plots are not confined to Russia and the Nihilists, but it is rather surprising to hear of one occurring in a Canadian city. An infernal machine, operated by clockwork, and containing some ten pounds of dynamite, was discovered beside the Montreal Court House on Saturday last fortunately in time to prevent its doing any damage.

A general rising of the Greeks in Macedonia against the Ottoman yoke in apprehended, and numbers of arrests of suspected persons are being made by the Turkish authorities.

MISS REYNOLDS, an Irish lady, who has been conspicuous at Beechaven for her advocacy of "no rent," has been served with a summons charging her with aiding and abetting a criminal conspiracy to prevent the payment of rent.
