Slams Protest

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False Impression Claimed In Memoria Bldg. Story

A story published elsewhere yesterday laid a false impression concerning procurement of material for the new Fathers of Confederation Building, it was learned last night in a telephone call to Dimitri Dimopoulos, of the architects firm of Affleck, Desbarats, Dimopoulos and Lebeson, Montreal.

The story said in part "at least three Canadian wholesale firms have protested the fact that architects for the Confederation Memorial building have specified that Swedish and English hardware to be used in the new structures."

"The firms have refused to supply the hardware covered in the specifications," the story read.

"In the first place," Mr. Dimopoulos explained, we asked for two alternatives, the first one a Swedish product and the other an American product by the name of Corbin. There was no question of specifying only Swedish materials."

As far as he was concerned "there is no Canadian manufacturer who could supply the type of hardware specified. What these manufacturers call hardware is in my opinion more pleasing in design and less expensive. There is no question of an inferior product as reported."

The Montreal architect emphasized that he did not specify anything of inferior quality because the budget was low for first class hardware. The report left the suggestion that all firms were refusing to supply the hardware. "There are five or more firms bidding for the contract. We have received a letter of refusal from one only, a French Canadian firm," he added.

Circus Fate Uncertain

YARMOUTH, N.S. (CP)—The five-damned circus ship Fleurus is to be hauled from the bottom of the harbor here but the fate of the show is still uncertain.

Irving C. Pink, representing the circus owners, said tenders to open the Fleurus will be opened Tuesday in Halifax at offices of the London Salvage Association.

Mr. Pink said there is a possibility the show will continue. However, no decision had been made.

The 33 circus personnel are billeted here temporarily.

LONDON (Reuters)—British sex-and-security scandal erupted anew in court Friday when two girls testified against the former Conservative party politician and that he had given her money for her mother.

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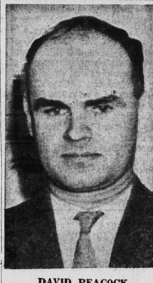
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
