Australian Tennis Stars Arrive In U.S.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Australian tennis stars Frank Sedgman and Ken McGregor arrived here by plane today for their professional debut Tuesday.

Soon after their airliner from Honolulu landed at International Airport, Sedgman and McGregor hurried to the town house for a meeting with Jack Kramer, the U. S. pro who financed the \$100,000 guarantee for the Aussies to tour with him and Pancho Segura.

They have scheduled practice sessions this afternoon and tomorrow before Sedgman meets Kramer and McGregor tangles with Segura in the professional opener. After two nights of play here, the quartet moves on to Madison Square Garden in New York to continue the series.

MELBOURNE, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Sir Norman Brookes, president of the Lawn Tennis Association of Australia, said tonight he had offered Frank Sedgman and Ken McGregor insurance company jobs with annual salaries rising from \$1,500 to the first year to \$5,000 in the fourth year.

TORONTO, Jan. 4.—(CP)—A 2½-hour operation which doctors termed successful, was performed today on Captain Ted Kennedy of the Toronto Maple Leafs.

Toronto doctors repaired a shoulder separation and torn ligaments suffered by Kennedy New Year's night in a game with Boston Bruins. Boston forward Milt Schmidt hurled Kennedy head-first on the ice during a fight.

The Toronto player will spend two or three weeks in hospital and will not be able to return to action with the Leafs this season.

Plan Dog Racing At Victoria, B.C.

VICTORIA, Jan. 4.—(CP)—Long-range plans aimed at introducing dog racing to Victoria were announced today by an organization known as the Vancouver Island Greyhound and Whippet Breeders Association.

The Association says changes in the Criminal Code due to become law in 1954 will legalize the racing of greyhounds and whippets in Canada. In the meantime, local enthusiasts plan to get started on building up racing stock.

Walter J. Pym, a former director of the Canadian Kennel Club and a driving force in the formation of the new association, said the dog breeding will provide a "considerable source" of revenue for retired and semi-retired persons.

Norwegian Paper Critical Of Hockey

OSLO, Jan. 3.—(CP)—Hockey was named today by the Oslo newspaper Dagbladet as the Olympic sport least likely to further international brotherhood and friendship.

During the Oslo Winter Games criticisms were made, particularly of the Canadian and U. S. teams, of roughness in hockey.

The paper said "sport should have its peace prize, and nominated Bob Richards, U. S. Olympic pole vault champion for the 1952 'sports peace prize' if such an award existed. Dagbladet cited Richards' efforts to 'further international peace and brotherhood' during last summer's Olympic Games at Helsinki.

His efforts in the field of fraternization met with the greatest understanding among all his competitors," the paper added. "His Soviet rival was the first to congratulate and hug him when he cleared the bar on his final jump."

Emil Zatopek, the Czech triple gold medal winner, was named as rock-bottom candidate for introducing politics into sports. Zatopek, winner of the 5,000 metre and 10,000 metre races and the marathon, sharply criticized the Americans after his return home.
