The Electric Light.
The experiment of lighting Montreal harbor by means of electricity has proved only fairly successful. The light is reported to be greatly superior to that previously afforded by the Gas Companies, but inferior to that which was promised and expected. It is said that each electric lamp costs on the average, inclusive of all expenses, eight cents per hour. The electric machine works well.

Garfield Accepts.
GENERAL GARFIELD has formally accepted the nomination of the Republican Party. Beyond doubt, the General is an able man; but the indications are that he has a hard road to travel before he reaches the White House—if, indeed, he does reach it. It is pretty evident that the United States desire a change of rulers.

A late paper states that the Republican party has suffered a serious loss by the failure to nominate General Grant at the Chicago convention. General Mahone, United States Senator-elect for Virginia, who, until recently, was always a Democrat of the most pronounced stripe, would have supported Grant on the broad ground that he was the candidate of the Nation, not of any section or of any particular party; that his success would break down sectional lines and unite the country as it has not been united since the war. As the political situation is now, General Mahone and his friends can find no such excuses for leaving the Democratic party and voting for the nominees of a Republican convention. They are obliged to express themselves satisfied with the candidates chosen at Cincinnati, and Mahone has already said in effect that he and his followers would give hearty support to Hancock.

United States Tariff Reform.
THERE are signs of a modification of the War Tariff of the United States. The views put forward by the newspapers are not only increasing, but more frequently expressed; and it is to be noted that the Democratic Party have made a change of the tariff one of the planks of their platform. Should they gain the Presidential election, Reciprocal trade with Canada will, probably, ensue. It appears that the Ways and Means Committee, whose duty it is to originate fiscal changes, has agreed to introduce a bill making certain reductions and abolitions, and some advantage will be gained by a popular discussion of its details, although there is, at present, no really good prospect of its being passed. The bill deals with articles imported of the annual value of \$60,000,000. It places upon the free list a few goods, chiefly of raw materials, such as quinine. Upon certain kinds of raw wools the duty is reduced to 20 per cent. *ad valorem*, and upon some woollen manufactures to 30 per cent. Flannels and knit goods are charged 40 per cent. On steel rails the proposed new duty is 1 per cent. per lb., and upon other descriptions of iron and steel manufactures some reduction is proposed.

Foreign Crop Reports.
The following are the latest mail advices relating to the crops and grain markets in foreign countries. The *Mark Lane Express* states that in England, Scotland, and Ireland "fine growing weather has been experienced during the past week; a higher temperature has been accompanied by an abundant rainfall, which has refreshed the country and exercised a most beneficial effect upon the growing crops. After such a cold, dry May, it is not to be wondered at that the growth cereals is backward, but it is a matter for congratulation that the crops have not suffered to anything like the extent that was at one time anticipated, the fields at present showing unmistakable signs of healthy vitality. At the beginning of the week a steady fall of rain occurred, which was pretty general throughout the Kingdom, and the subsequent sunshine has materially improved the condition of cereals. With a continuance of warmth to stimulate rapid development, the crops will doubtless recover the leeway lost by

the end of the month and gain sufficient strength to enable them to withstand future vicissitudes of weather of any ordinary character. In certain districts in the Midland and other countries the wheat plant is reported thin, although of good color, but generally speaking sanguine hopes are entertained of a fair average crop.

In France general satisfaction is expressed in the aggregate of the Provincial advices to hand. For the moment only one thing is desired, fine weather to carry the hay, and to favor the flowering of the wheat in the Northern departments. On the whole, the wheat, colza, beet and oat crops give much promise. In Brittany the buckwheat is favorably spoken of.

In Germany the weather continues favorable for the growing crops. Wheat and barley look promising, oats not so good, and rye will be deficient to a considerable extent. Grass, rather backward, has latterly improved materially. Potatoes are in a satisfactory state.

Pic-Nics.
The "Heather Belle" left Steam Navigation Company's Wharf at 10 o'clock this morning for McCannell's Wharf, with about two hundred and fifty pic-nickers, under the auspices of the Benevolent Irish Society. She left again at 2 p. m., with a supplementary batch of pleasure seekers. The steamer "Southport" left Ferry Wharf shortly after 10 o'clock, having on board about six hundred of the Methodist Sunday School children, together with quite a number of their teachers, parents, sisters, cousins, etc. A large number followed in the Southport at 2 p. m. The pic-nickers all were happy in having escaped, for one day at least, the dusty streets of Charlottetown. The arrangements, in both cases, were good.

The Princes and the Marriage Question.
The names of the Duke of Edinburgh, the Duke of Connaught, and the Prince of Wales have appeared among those who by their votes, supported the second reading of the Marriage with a Deceased Wife's Sister Bill. This has again given great pain in many quarters. Latterly it has been a generally accepted fact that the Princes of the Blood Royal should not take either side in any opposed questions that are submitted to the House of Lords. It certainly is difficult to understand why an exception should have been made in this case to so salutary a rule. There is, perhaps, no measure which gives rise to a more bitter controversy, and no doubt this Bill does run counter to the religious convictions and social prejudices of a very large and respectable portion of the community. In the recent division only one prelate voted in favor of it, whilst an archbishop and eleven bishops voted against the measure. Even Scotland is against it almost a man.—*London World*, June 30.

Latest News Notes.
Severe earthquakes are reported from Switzerland and the Azores. Eighteen of the principal maritime powers of the world have approved the new international regulations for preventing collisions at sea. Three hundred and eighty-one steamers and barges have passed through Rideau Canal up to the present time, as compared with 274 last year, and still the Grits are not happy. Lord Kenmura has followed the example of the Marquis of Lansdowne, and resigned from the Imperial Ministry, on account of opposition to the Irish compensation for disturbance bill.

The Porte has given Montenegro favorable assurances of a satisfactory settlement of the question in dispute. Doubt is still expressed as to the intention of the Porte to carry out the recommendations of the Berlin Conference.

In the House of Commons Mr. Gladstone has promised the earliest information possible regarding the effect of the note of the Powers to the Porte, as he did not wish to startle the country with the announcement of Great Britain's sole action in enforcing the recommendations of the Conference.

Advices from the Magdalen Islands, to the 12th inst., report: "A week of warm, rainy weather, which has caused a marked improvement in the appearance of the crops. The fisheries are good but bait scarce, and the herring fleet are doing remarkably well. A few mackerel have also made their appearance in Pleasant Bay. A terrific thunder-storm passed over the Island last night. The electric fluid demolished a dwelling house at Etang du Nord and severely injured one of the inmates."
