Illegal Sale Of Liquor Results In \$350 Fine

SUMMERSIDE - Emmanuel Gallant of Summerside was fined \$350 in town police court yesterday for selling liquor unlawfully to another person.

Representing the crown, Police Chief S. D. A. Wansmaker said this was not a case of selling liquor but of selling to an accused's first offence and the boys who had purchased the liquor had not suffered any ill effects and had not caused any trouble.

Witnesses Testify In Rape Case At Side

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU - THE GARDIAN - The case of Cedric Frederick Bodechon, Minto, N.B., charged with the rape of a 17-year-old Summerside girl, opened in Supreme Court here yesterday with 19 or 20 crowd witnesses appearing before a petty jury and Mr. Justice Mark McGuigan.

The complaint against Bodechon was made at approximately 5:30 p.m., June 27, just more than 12 hours after the alleged offence. Those persons giving evidence who had been in the car the night of June 26 included Joseph "Junior" Cannon, Summerside, married to a niece of the accused; Victoria "Vicki" Gallant, niece of the accused, now of Minto, N.B.; Mary Amelia "Sally" Cannon, Summerside, now of Minto, N.B.; Ruth Helen Gallant; Elgin Everett Murray, who took Bodechon to pick up his car June 27; Mrs. Rose Gallant; Capt. 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Commerce Bank Sets Records, Report Shows

A major increase in assets with new highs in all major areas of the bank's business is reflected in the 97th annual statement released by the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce.

Total assets at \$526,614,000, up \$846 million, marks the first time in the bank's history the fiscal year-end figures have exceeded \$500,000,000. Total deposits reflect a corresponding growth and at \$472,272,000 are up \$447,000,000 from last year's high.

Gains were recorded in both personal savings deposits, which now total \$2,209,446,000, up \$130,000,000 from a year ago, and in other deposits by the public which at \$492,853,000 are up \$97,000,000 over the previous year-end figures.

Commercial and other current loans at \$211,400,000 are up \$29 million from last year's record high while day-to-day, call and short loans at \$399,524,000 are up \$107,000,000 from a year ago.

(Continued from page 1) some \$133,000,000, are geared to average per-capita yields of the provincial direct-tax shares. They also reflect, in part, a province's revenues from its resources. The payments now go to all provinces except Ontario, British Columbia and Alberta, where per capita revenues are above the national average.

British Columbia wants equalization payments abolished, calling them "distasteful and unfair." Saskatchewan wants them increased to bring per-capita revenues up to the level of the richest province, Ontario. Different views come from other provinces.

This week's agenda proposed cuts in federal government industries is likely to result in withdrawing from some of the shared-cost programs. These include hospital insurance, where it pays some \$348,000,000, unemployment assistance, a \$109,000,000 item; and such measures as help to the blind, disabled and needy persons aged 65-69, which together cost Ottawa \$62,700,000.

The federal government's view, as expressed in Liberal party election statements, is that provinces which carry on these programs on their own would be compensated by getting a larger portion of the shared tax funds.

Here, too, there are differences of opinion. Quebec wants a federal withdrawal from even more shared-cost programs, including the
