Forage Crop Problems Slated For Discussion

Several of the Maritime Provinces' better farmers and a few professional agricultural men will participate in a program of information and discussion for Island farmers scheduled for the new Vocational Institute, Mahabogue Road, Tuesday March 2.

Frank Luter, Moncton will discuss "My farm forage crop" and "What's in a P.F. fertilizer?" findings on forage crop research at the Experimental Farm by Research Officer Norman Black, which will include a discussion of rates and timing of fertilizer applications of fertilizer on pastures and hayland.

Also scheduled is a talk by Dr. James Nicholson, research officer at Nappan, N.S., on "Livestock feeding for efficient production" and E. Gilbert, Fredericton on "Forage harvesting and storage."

The discussions get underway at 10 a.m. sharp but there will be a tour of the Institute prior to that which gets underway at 11.5.

S.C. Wright, deputy minister of agriculture, will be chairman through the discussions.

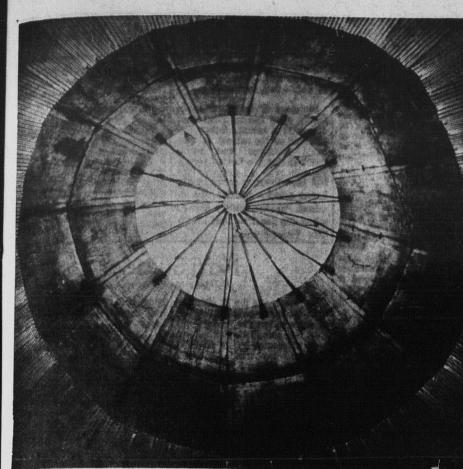
