Steel Output Shows Easing

CLEVELAND (AP)—Better-than-average steel shipments, but a sharp curtailment of ingot production, are expected in July, by the American Iron and Steel Institute. "The removal of the strike threat has had much effect on next month's shipments," the institute's spokesman said. "In July, output will be about 1,000,000 tons, or 10 per cent below the 1,100,000 tons in June. The steelbackers are mainly in production areas where inventory building has been the heaviest." Steel production will make its first consecutive weekly decline this week, with the output less than the estimated 2,400,000 tons produced last week, the institute said. It estimated steel production will total about \$2,200,000 during the first six months of this year, compared with \$4,098,179 in the corresponding period of 1962. The magazine's price com-
