Semi-Final Game At Boston On March 29

MONTREAL (CP)—The National Hockey League announced today that the first home game for Boston Bruins in the Stanley Cup semi-finals opening next week will be March 29, regardless of whether Montreal Canadiens or New York Rangers are the opposition.

Dates for both series of semi-finals, announced by the NHL today, scheduled the first game in Boston either March 29 or 30.

The Bruins now have chosen Friday, March 29, and have made a change in one sub-sequent date. If the best-of-seven series against either Montreal or New York continues long enough, the game originally scheduled for Saturday April 6 will be played Saturday April 5.

Opening date for both semi-final series is March 25.

Canada Wins British Title

ALDERSHOT, England (CP)—Canada Wednesday won the British Army basketball championship for the fourth time in six years, defeating a British Guards training regiment team 76-55 in the final game of a three-day tournament.

The Canadian team, drawn from members of the Queen's Own Rifles of Canada stationed in Germany with the 4th Canadian Infantry Brigade group, led throughout the fast, cleanly-fought contest.

The victory avenged the Canadian quintet's only loss in the tournament, a 52-48 defeat inflicted by the Guards in the opening game. The Canadians reached the finals by defeating a second British entry 39-30 earlier in the day.

Lieut. Douy Palmer of Burlington Beach, Ont., and Lieut. Bill McAndrew of Charlottetown led the Canadians' scoring in the final with 32 and 14 points respectively.

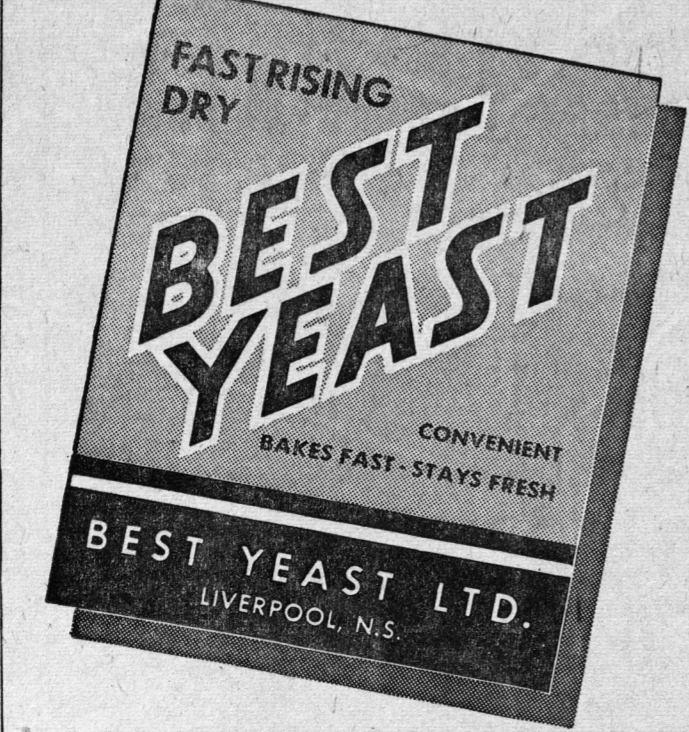

Roy Campanella Feeling Better

GLEN COVE, N.Y. (AP) — A friend visited Roy Campanella in hospital and asked the half-paralyzed Los Angeles Dodger catcher how he felt.

Campanella grinned broadly and replied: "I'm scuffin'."

The incident was related Wednesday by Frank Slocum, an aide to baseball commissioner Ford Frick. Slocum was the only person except Campanella's wife and attending physicians allowed in the catcher's room.

"He is doing much better than I expected or even hoped he would be," Slocum said. "I don't mean he is laughing but he has made progress physically and mentally."

Campanella suffered a broken

neck Jan. 28 in a car crash. There was fear at first he might never walk again.

The latest hospital bulletin said Campanella has recovered a sense of feeling as far down as his lower abdomen and added: "This gives rise to hope."

BROODED AT FIRST

Slocum continued: "... When he had recovered from the first shock of his injury, he told me, he had a brooding lack of interest in baseball to a point he not only wouldn't discuss it but didn't like to have anyone else do so.

"But when I walked in, he was listening to a Yankee game on the radio and he spoke of some of their hitters and how he could want them pitched to if he were catching.

"But after a few innings he seemed to tire. He asked the nurse to turn it off."

Ray Robinson Is Back In Chicago

CHICAGO (AP) — Challenger Sugar Ray Robinson and company arrived in his lucky fight town Tuesday for a title rematch with middleweight champion Carmen Basilio in Chicago Stadium next Tuesday.

Robinson's entourage of 14 included co-manager George Gainford, who said Sugar Ray has become so irked at Basilio's demand for a "fair" officiating shake that he will knock him out within five rounds.

"That way Robinson will make certain there will be no question of Basilio hollering about being robbed," said Gainford.

Basilio, who arrived Monday and jugged Tuesday with a Japanese judo expert, claims Illinois officiating and not a Chicago jinx was responsible for him losing three bouts here.

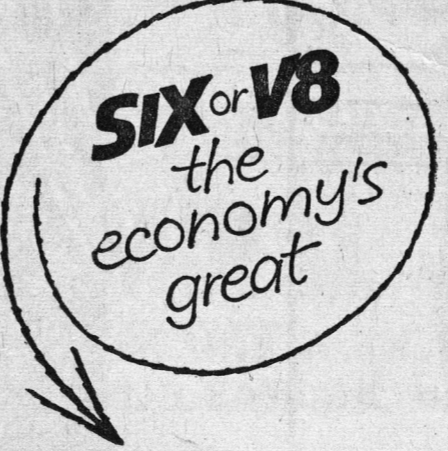
