

Traffic Toll Mounts Sharply in Canada, United States

As least 33 persons, nine less than last year, died in traffic accidents during the Labor Day weekend.

A Canadian Press survey showed that, altogether, 74 persons died violently in mishaps associated with normal holiday activities by midnight A.D.T.

The survey, which started at 6 p.m. local time Friday, ran to midnight.

The Canadian Highway Safety Council had predicted that 35 persons would lose their lives on the roads during the week-end.

Multiple - traffic deaths pushed the total toll up in Ontario alone, 11 persons died

in two accidents. One took six lives, the other five.

CHICAGO (AP) - Highway motorists in the U.S. were killing a record number of more than six an hour Monday - a pace that threatened to establish a record number of traffic fatalities for a Labor Day holiday weekend.

With millions starting the homebound trek from weekend vacation spots, the traffic toll had climbed to 21 in comparison with last year's Labor Day toll of 386. In addition there were 21 deaths in boating accidents, 49 drownings and 86 deaths from miscellaneous accidents for an overall total of 600.

Shocked by the mounting hourly death rate Sunday and Monday, the National Safety Council revised upwards its preliminary estimate of the possible holiday toll to 600 or more.

Before the start of the three-day weekend at 6 p.m. local time, Highway officials had estimated that between 410 and 400 persons would be killed in highway accidents during the week-end.

The record traffic death toll for a Labor Day weekend is 461, set in 1951.

Experimental Barley Plots Reported Showing

An experimental barley-growing project undertaken this summer in this province is giving very encouraging results.

The project, which was sponsored by Canada Packers Limited in co-operation with the Prince Edward Island Department of Agriculture, involved the setting up of six experimental barley plots at various locations on the Island.

It was expected that the project would demonstrate the possible yield of barley and encourage the growing of barley on the Island.

SIX PLOTS SOWN

A total of six barley plots were sown under the project, with four being located on established farms in various parts of the province. The required amounts of barley seed and fertilizer were provided to the farmers by

Canada Packers, and sowing took place about June 1. In all cases the plots are now showing good clean stands of barley, and it is expected that they will all record an excellent yield when harvesting takes place in late August or early September.

Actual yields will be checked when the plots are harvested at the end of the season.

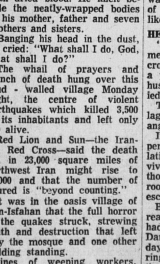

SOME GO HURT

At the height of the riots, the best highjacks and some heads were bloodied.
