
PARTIES using the Telephones would find talking much more satisfactory if they would observe the following rules:—

- 4th. It is possible to talk and be heard when standing back two or three feet from the transmitter, if you do not talk too loudly, but it is not a pleasant mode of conversation, is entirely unnecessary, and is a useless waste of wind and lungs, besides being very annoying to all within range of your voice.

Obituary.

We are called upon to-day to chronicle the death of two highly respected residents of Crapaud—Mr. Edward Rogerson and Mr. James Cameron—who have recently been called very suddenly away. Mr. Rogerson was in the 68th year of his age, and leaves behind him a widow, sister of Isaac Smith, Esq., of Crapaud, and one daughter, Mrs. Robert Moore, of Westmoreland. Two brothers also survive him—William and Thomas, William being the eldest of the family, and Thomas the youngest—and a large circle of relatives.

Mr. Cameron was in his 77th year and leaves behind him a widow, three sons and three daughters. One son and three daughters are living in the States. The two sons living here are K. H. Cameron, of the firm of McLean and Cameron, and W. W. Cameron, Augustine Cove. Mr. Rogerson was a member of St. John's Episcopal Church, Crapaud, and was buried in the cemetery here on Saturday, the 16th inst. Mr. Cameron was connected with the Methodist Church, and was buried in the cemetery at Tryon on Friday, the 16th inst. The funeral processions in both instances were very large. The bereaved families have the sympathy of the entire community.
