HON. W. B. IVES

Suddenly Struck Down and Beyond Hope of Recovery.

OTTAWA, July 13.—When the east-bound train arrived in Ottawa last evening it was learned that Hon. W. B. Ives, member of the House of Commons for Sherbrooke, and formerly President of the Privy Council and Minister of Trade and Commerce, was on board in a state of unconsciousness. Mr. Ives was returning from the Pacific Coast. He had breakfast at North Bay, was spoken to by friends at the time and was apparently in good health. He returned to the sleeping car and shortly after the train pulled out of North Bay he was found in the smoking compartment in an unconscious state. The physicians pronounce the patient in a most dangerous condition, the attack being one of paralysis of the brain. There is no hope of recovery.

TRURO, July 12.—Montreal papers of July 8th contained accounts of the marriage of F. C. J. Swainson, of Truro, well known among Halifax cricketers, to Miss Ethel Gowen, niece of Sir Henry Joly, which took place on the 7th in the English cathedral at Quebec. Very Rev. Dean Williams officiating. Swainson and his bride arrived here by the late train last night and were serenaded by the Truro band at the Prince of Wales Hotel. During the evening Swainson was waited on by S. D. McLellan and Sheriff McLellan, who served papers on him on behalf of Miss Jean Sutherland, daughter of George Sutherland, Park street, for breach of promise. Dr. W. S. Muir, and Mr. Snook, of W. H. Snook & Co., grocers, gave bonds in \$10,000 for Swainson's appearance at the October term of the Supreme Court here.

Swainson and bride left this morning for the Sydney carnival. Swainson is English, and is said to be wealthy. His attentions to Miss Sutherland for some time created much talk around town. He was a constant visitor at the house, and it is said he said an affectionate farewell when he left Truro to wed another at Quebec.

Nothing in the history of Truro has created so much excitement, and the case will be watched with intense interest till settled.

Island Horses Among the Winners.

NORTH SYDNEY, C. B., June 13.—A large number of spectators attended the horse races yesterday.

The 2.35 class was not finished, Taney, of Sydney, taking two heats and Bertha L. of Halifax one heat, best time 2.30.

DREYFUS INTERESTED.

In the Romance of his own Life.

RENNES, July 12.—In his intense desire to understand his case Dreyfus is sitting up nearly all night reading the numerous documents furnished by his lawyers.

"Why fatigue yourself?" pleaded Mme. Dreyfus.

"I am anxious to read my own romance," replied Dreyfus grimly, showing he has not entirely lost his sense of humor.

The military tailor at Rennes has received orders to make a new uniform for Dreyfus, and will take measures of the prisoner this week.

He is passionately interested in the intricacies of the affair, all of which Mme. Dreyfus wants forgotten once the process is ended. Some of her friends tell her to seek vengeance for her wrongs, but neither she nor her husband wish for revenge. Dreyfus' lawyers had prepared a paper to ask the State for damages for illegal imprisonment. Dreyfus refused to be a party, but for form's sake he told the lawyers he was willing to ask for one franc damages, the lowest the law of France allows. The lawyers hope to persuade Dreyfus to change his mind.

This man must be made of the right sort of stuff, and 20 cents damages for five years of torture is modest indeed.

French Shore Question.

ST. JOHN'S, N.B., July 12.—The Colonial authorities are understood to have been informed that the report of the Royal Commission of Enquiry into the French Shore complications is withheld for the present by the British Colonial Office, because it so strongly endorses the case of Newfoundland that its publication would provoke another Fashoda difficulty. Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, the Imperial Secretary of State for the Colonies, has, however, determined to force the French to abandon their arrogant pretensions on the coast before another season opens.

IN THE SENATE.

Grand Trunk Bill Read a Second Time.

OTTAWA, July 8.—Senator Perley's motion to give the Grand Trunk bill the six months' rest was defeated in the Senate last evening by a vote of 17 to 37. All the Conservative ex-ministers in the Chamber voted with the ministers against the bill.

The bill was then read a second time on the same division reversed and the committee stage fixed for Friday.

The Drummond County bill was read a second time on the same division.

The West Huron election case will come before the Privileges and Election Committee next Tuesday.

Cabinet Crisis in Spain.

MADRID, July 12.—A Cabinet crisis is almost inevitable. General Polavieja, Minister of War, and Marquis Pidal, Minister of Foreign Affairs, will, it is said, resign in consequence of their disapproval of the reduction in expenditures, especially in the War Office, which is insisted upon by Senor Villaverde, Minister of Finance.

Martial Law Declared.

BELGRADE, Servia, July 12.—Martial law has been declared throughout the Department of Belgrade, including this city, owing to discoveries made during the course of the enquiry into the recent attempt upon the life of former King Milan.

Help Offered.

BRISBANE, Queensland, July 12.—The Governor has cabled to the Secretary of State for the colonies, Joseph Chamberlain, offering 500 mounted infantry with machine gun for service in South Africa in case of hostilities between Great Britain and the Transvaal.

Movement of Warships.

LORENZE MARUZZI, Delagoa Bay, July 11.—The British second-class cruiser Doris and the gunboat Widgdon, with Rear Admiral Sir Robert B. Harris, in command of the Cape and West Africa station, on board the cruiser, arrived here.

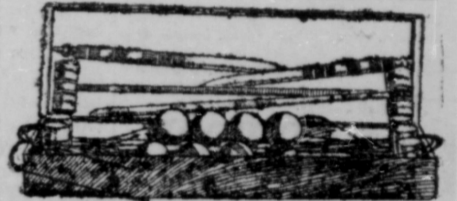
