To Discontinue Visual Storm Warning Signals

OTTAWA, Mar. 17—(CP)—Canada is abandoning her storm-warning signals—from coast to coast and on her inland waterways—as a relic of the horse-and-buggy days. Air Vice-Marshal A. T. Cowley, in charge of Meteorological Services for the Transport Department, said today the move is being taken as an economy measure. The signals—a visual system of banners on mastheads at some 80 points on the east and west coast and on the Great Lakes—will be abandoned April 1.
