German Artist Goes On Trial

LUEBECK, Germany (AP)—A 41-year-old penniless German artist went on trial here Tuesday charged with faking medieval frescoes in a historic church and a cathedral. Lothar Malskat, the artist, brought on the charges two years ago when he said he was tired of not getting credit for his talent.

At the same time, he admitted forging paintings and selling them as valuable "old masters."

Three others were implicated, Dietrich Fey, an art dealer, Dr. Bruno Fendrich, an architect, and To Dietrich, a fellow artist.

Fey hired Malskat and the other declared Fey was commissioned to restore 15th century frescoes, almost erased by age, which were uncovered in the Marienkirche here after it was burned out by an Allied air raid.

A similar job was done in the Schleswig Cathedral, Malskat said. The "restored" frescoes were praised in the art world as "old masterpieces."

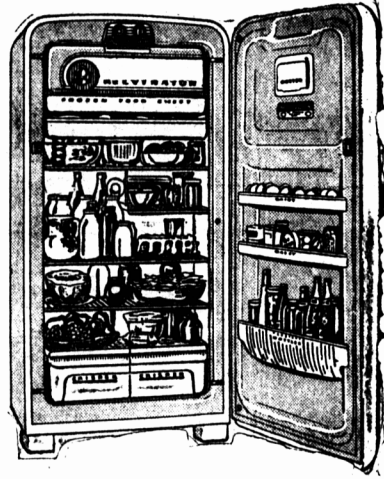

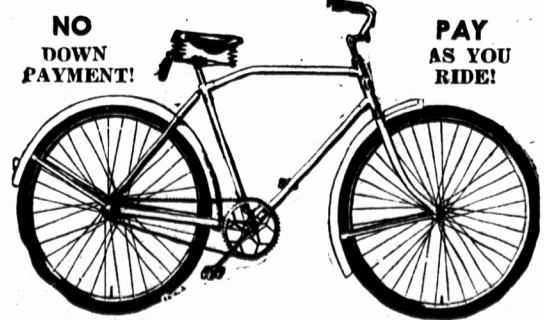
