HUMAN CROQUET

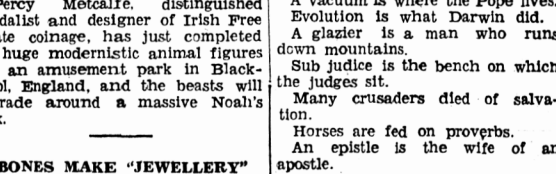

Husbands Have Curious Conceptions and Expectations When it Comes to Managing Homes—Wives, After All, Are Something More Than Servants

Dear God, bless their simple souls and keep 'em that way, have a lot of queer superstitions about women. They believe, for instance:

That every pretty girl with large blue eyes is an innocent little angel who doesn't know what she is doing when she murders somebody, or is caught shoplifting; that it is mere childlike superstition that makes her twiddle diamond bracelets out of them and buy her silk lingerie and take her to the most expensive night clubs. Men judge a woman by her complexion and not by her morals.

That once a woman loves a man she automatically goes on loving him, no matter what sort of a cad he turns out to be or how badly he treats her. COLOURS AND COSMETICS The make-up which doesn't "stay put" is the problem about which one hears many a moan. "Why does my nose shine and my face look greasy just a couple of hours after I've powdered?" is the question repeated dozens and dozens of times.

Firstly because women are careless about that indispensable link between cleansing and make-up—the astringent lotion. The pores which have been opened by warm water and soap or by cleansing cream, must be closed by skin tonic or astringent, before make-up begins.

Secondly, the make-up foundation may be wrong. The greasy skin must have an astringent foundation; the dry skin needs a little nourishment even during the day. And the shiny nose needs a special base all to itself.

Many foundation creams and lotions are now made in colors, and you choose them as you do your powder—to tone exactly with your skin. Having worked one's foundation well into the skin, covering every inch of it, the complexion is ready for rouge. Cream rouge is better for the dry skin, powder of compact rouge for the greasy skin.

ROUGE LIGHTLY Touch the cheeks lightly with rouge, placing it in a triangle along the cheekbone, pointing downwards towards the jawline. Carry a touch up to the eyes to conceal shadows, or at night use a trifle of mauve eyeshadow here if the eyes are tired.

Now the slightest touch of eyeshadow. It should come with your eyes, but you can let yourself go a little for the evening; the fair-skinned girl may try the silvery shades of green, blue, brown and mauve; the dark-skinned woman will like such colors as gold-green and dark green.

Taking the smallest possible amount of eyeshadow on the finger tip, blend it smoothly over the lids. It must disappear completely into the foundation cream where it leaves off.

PLENTY OF POWDER If you have ever noticed how over-powdered many noses are, you will be surprised to know that most women don't use nearly enough powder when they make up! The secret is to use plenty of powder, applying it from the neck upwards and leaving the nose until last, so that it won't be conspicuous. Then, having pressed it in with the puff, or with a special little powder-finish brush, which looks like a miniature shaving brush, you must dust away the surplus.

Now you are ready for the accents—lipstick, eyebrow pencil, mascara. Buying an eyebrow pencil is no longer a matter of choosing between black and brown. You can get a variety of shades for your brows as well as your lashes, and a brow and lash cream will give a silky finish and encourage the hairs to grow.

THE COOK'S CORNER

APERITIF WEDGES

Round slices rye or white bread, lemon butter, pickled pearl onions for garnish. 1. Caviar; 2. Chopped egg white, minced onion, mayonnaise; 3. Mashed egg yolks, butter, dry mustard, salt and pepper; 4. Chopped sweet pickle parsley, green pepper, mayonnaise; 5. Creamed Roquefort cheese; 6. Seasoned salmon paste, chopped pimiento and mayonnaise; 7. Anchovy paste.

Method: One round slice of bread spread with lemon butter, arrange the different fillings in circles, beginning at centre. Arrange a row of pickled onions between 4th and 5th rows. To serve, cut in wedge-shaped pieces.

SPECIAL FLOUR FOR CAKES

4 cups all purpose flour, 1 cup corn starch. Method: Sift 4 or 5 times and use as cake flour.

MINCED DRESSING FOR VEGETABLES

1 cup oil, 1/2 teaspoon mustard, 1/2 cup chopped onion, 1/2 cup chili sauce, 6 tablespoons vinegar, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/4 cup minced parsley, 1 diced hard cooked egg. Method: Shake in bottle and serve immediately. Never let egg stand in mixture too long.

BROILED STEAK

Rub steak with oil and dry mustard. Broil and season. Serve hot. The mustard brings out the flavor and the oil keeps steak from getting crusty.

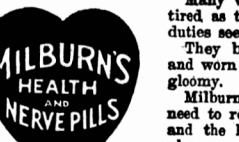
"ENGAGEMENT" CAKE

4 1/2 cups pastry flour, 6 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 6 egg whites, 3/4 cup shortening, 2 cups sugar, 1/2 cup syrup, 1 1/2 cups milk, 2 teaspoons vanilla. Method—Sift and measure flour. Add baking powder and salt to flour and sift 3 times. Cream shortening, add sugar gradually, beating until light and fluffy. Add flour mixture alternately with milk and vanilla. Mix well. Fold egg whites which have been beaten until stiff. Bake in greased pan in 350 deg. F. oven about 1 hour. Directions for assembling cake given in class. Frost with 7-minute icing.

ARROWROOT PUDDING

1/4 cup corn starch, 1-3 cup syrup, few grains salt, 1 cup cold water, 3 cups scalded milk Arrowroot, biscuits, 1/2 cup strawberry jam, 1 cup whipped cream. Method—Mix corn starch, syrup and salt, blend with cold water, pour into scalded milk and cook until thick, stirring to prevent lumping, about thirty minutes. Cool. Line a greased pan with arrowroot biscuits, turn the pudding into it, chill until firm. Unmold, serve with mixed jam and cream.
