Nothing Less Than \$3,000 Is Labor View

By the point of view of a labor, anything less than \$3,000 a year of take-home pay is not a reasonable family wage in Charlottetown. Dr. Brendan O'Grady suggested to some 30 persons attending the fifth meeting of the labor union conducted by the Social Action Department of St. Dunstan's University, last night.

"This amount is still not the ideal," the speaker said, "and the goal is to have a real approach of labour in collective bargaining will seem to be achieved after that we look to successive stages of mutual accommodation and finally to full co-operation between labour and management."

The three factors which should influence collective bargaining he said, are the needs of workers, the conditions of the industry and the requirements of the common good.
