

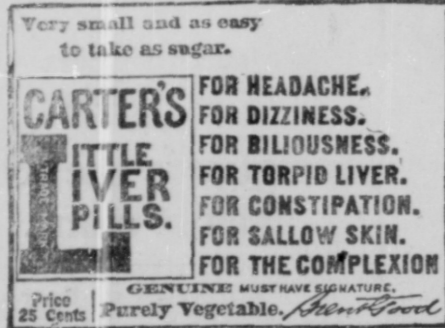

### DR. RAND AND THE MICMACS

A melancholy interest will always be attached to the Indians of North America and their fate; and we have no doubt that Mr. Jeremiah S. Clarke's interesting work on "Rand and the Micmacs," just issued from THE EXAMINER office, will be widely read. Dr. Rand devoted his life to the service of the tribe. As a frontispiece to Mr. Clark's work there is a splendid likeness of the learned doctor; and an excellent study of his life and character is contributed as an introduction by the Rev. Robert Murray, D. D., Editor of the Presbyterian Witness, who says:

"His life-work was to master the Micmac language, to find his way to the hearts of the poor children of the forest, and to tell them the story of the Gospel in its simplicity. He made the language his own; he gathered the traditions of the Indians and learned their ways; and in many instances found his way to their hearts. He not only translated portions of the New Testament and Psalms into Micmac, but prepared a complete vocabulary of the language. The work and his Bible translations are in print, and may be found useful."

It is beautifully remarked by the same writer that "A man like Dr. Rand is a gift from God, for which any community ought to be grateful; and the remembrance of him ought to be lovingly cherished."

Of Mr. Clarke's work we shall take an opportunity to express our opinion after we have had time to peruse it with care. It is supplemented by Dr. Rand's poem entitled "The Dying Indian's Dream," and by a number of Dr. Rand's Latin translations—the whole forming a well written and permanent contribution to Canadian literature.

The Montreal Gazette remarks that "Mr. Michael Davitt is evidently being well received by the Boer chiefs. Mr. Davitt is, in his way, quite as anti-English as they are, and a common dislike may make them take to each other. It is all the same a mission of doubtful wisdom he is engaged on, even from his own point of view. The Boer sympathizer who aspired to fill the seat in Parliament which he resigned is not likely to boast of the vote he received."

The Summerside Journal says that: "People very reasonably wonder how long the legal affairs of this province are to be conducted by an Attorney General who has no seat in the legislature, and who is consequently not responsible to the electors for any of his official acts. Responsible government is a principle highly cherished by the people of Prince Edward Island, but the present government, by setting that principle at defiance, is establishing a dangerous precedent."
