ture has been one of bungling, misrepresentation and misjudgment," he said.

The government had lost the United Kingdom market as had another Liberal Government in the 1920's. Efforts should be made to regain the overseas markets.

Dan Riley (L.-St. John-Albert) said that when Mr. Rowe spoke of recession and depression "my mind harked back to the great experience he must have had in such such matters."

Mr. Rowe's experience in such matters was probably responsible for the "reward he received in the dying days of the Bennett regime."

Mr. Rowe was appointed to the cabinet a few months before the defeat of the Conservative Government of the late Viscount Bennett, in office from 1930 to 1935.

reached the deck. "I went down to the engine room to start one of the engines, to warm it up and do some work on it," he said. "It was the strangest thing. There was an explosion inside the supercharger. I never heard tell of anything like it before."

There was just the one shot of flame. Then the whole engine room was a solid mass of flames. I couldn't get to the fire extinguishers, so I started to get out."

Robertson's clothes were ripped to shreds when one of the explosions hurled him into the bay, but two wallets in his hip pockets were left intact. Fished from the water, he received treatment for burns to the face, chest and leg.

steeem of Communist leaders in Canada and elsewhere.

Walsh said he decided to come out into the open because of the Communist insistence that United States atom spies Julius and Ethel Rosenberg be saved "at all costs."

"Moscow's emissaries want to save the blunders, otherwise it would become much more difficult to keep and recruit Communist spies," he told newspapermen.

Walsh said in an interview that during the last 10 years he was induced by a group of "patriotic, anti-Communist citizens" to retain his Communist ties and gather information about Communist activities in Canada.

He did not make the group in the present circumstances, but emphasized "they are not the R.C.M.P., the government or anyone like that." Others, too, were "risking their lives daily" as undercover men in Communist ranks.

He said the orders to prepare sabotage plants in forests and hydro-electric plants in Canada came "directly from Moscow through a union official" who visited Russia last year.

West Coast Plans
 Walsh said his next step will be to expose Communist activity at the hydro-electric and aluminum project at Kitimat, B.C.

"Communist cells there and in other large industries on the West Coast are co-ordinated by a man named Harvey Murphy, a Russian whose real name is 'Cherniavsky,'" he said.

Walsh added that Murphy was a graduate of the Marx-Engels Institute of Moscow, a school for saboteurs, and is "apparently" the west coast leader of the International Union of Mines, Mill and Smelter Workers Ind.

Walsh, who joined Communist groups 18 years ago, during the depression of the 1930s, said he resigned from the various organizations.

Termed Fabrication
 TORONTO, (CP)—Tim Buck, national leader of the Labor-Progressive Communist party, has termed a "fabrication" a report by Pat Walsh that Moscow has ordered Canadian Communists to blow up hydro plants and burn paper mills and forests in the event of war.

"Walsh was never a member of the LPP, much less an organizer of the party," Buck said in a statement. "His avowed reason for not joining the LPP was the claim that he was a member of the Irish Republican Army and that the con-

Strange But True

Marriages performed by clergy of the Methodist Church were not legal under Upper Canada Legislation until 1831. Why? Because the Church of England enjoyed the privileges of a state church in that section of Canada. The Province of New Brunswick boasts the first institution in North America to care for the mentally ill. Prior to this, the "have nots" were confined to a poorhouse, or jail, while the well-to-do were transported to overseas asylums.

The lash was the prescribed treatment for erring soldiers during the French regime and early part of British rule 500 lashes on the bare back was the punishment meted out for habitual drunkenness, and 1000 lashes for rioting.

Of the 5000 Loyalists who arrived at New Brunswick in 1783 each got a plot of ground, 500 feet of lumber, together with bricks and shingles from the British authorities, who also gave the settlers free provisions for one year. 2/3's free provisions for the 2nd year and 1/3 free provisions for the 3rd year.

In addition to these grants, the British government paid the Loyalists in New Brunswick 3,292,452 pounds sterling to compensate them for the loss sustained by the confiscation of their property during the American Revolution and 204 Loyalists living in New Brunswick were pensioned on account of loss of former office in the American Colonies. Officers who fought on Britain's side received a yearly pension.

Compulsory military training was in force in this country many years ago. Men between the ages of 15 and 50 were subject to military call and fined \$4.00 if they did not "toe the mark" promptly. For officers the penalty was \$8.00.

By an Act of the Legislature of Upper Canada at the beginning of the War of 1812, anyone enlisting ten soldiers was promoted lieutenant; twenty enlisted a Captain and fifty enlistments produced a Major!

In many sections of rural Quebec families continue the old practice of setting up crosses with their crops. This is a hand down from French pioneer days when the people set up the first roadside crosses as religious meeting places before churches were numerous. Symbols of the crucifixion hung on most of the crosses.

The Chesapeake Bay retriever is America's only native sporting dog. No authentic record of its origin exists. However, there is a legend which says that the breed originated from two puppies, Canton and Sailor, aboard an English brig bound for Newfoundland and wrecked off the coast of Maryland in 1807.

The light colored pathway across the sky that we see in the Milky Way is nothing but the reflection of the stars between the Earth and the outer rim of this gigantic wheel.

Manitoba, with 1/16 of the population of the Dominion during the ears of the First World War supplied 1/9th of the soldiers who fought overseas.

An impression was in force in the various Canadian seaports from 1795 to 1820 as a means of filling the crews of the British Navy Ships. A law legalizing this procedure was passed in 1779.

An old Scotch adage had this to say about young thieves: "Hansy when they are young and they'll no steal when they are old." There's no chance for an argument there. But one does not have to go to Scottish records for such gruesome tales. Indeed not! Right here in Canada the law was pretty free with the gallows in by-gone days. Here's the revealing record between 1812

The procedure to be followed in implementing the agreement is being worked out in London, the department said, adding:

"Offices are being set up in London, New York and other centres where it will be necessary for holders of certain of these bonds to transmit them for validation before any payments can be made."

"Canadians who are owed trade or private debts will have to work out the manner of settlement with the German debtor within the overall terms of the agreement."

and 1840; 13 men were hanged at Montreal for cattle theft; 12 were hanged for burglary, 2 for shoplifting, 6 for rape and sacrilege, 2 for the theft of a loaf of bread, etc. There were a total of 54 hangings in this country in this period, exclusive of 239 hanging verdicts which were subsequently reprieved.

The last public hanging in Canada took place on the 11th of February, 1869, at Ottawa. The victim was P. J. Whelan, who murdered Thomas D'Arcy McGee.

Nova Scotia is the only Province that can boast a flag of its own. It is an ensign dating back to 1621 when charter was granted to William Alexander by King James I of England. The flag was designed for the royal coat of arms granted our sister province in 1625—a white background with a blue St. Andrew's cross dividing the field into 4 sections. In the center stands the lion of Scotland.
