

Pipe Band At S'side Station For Air Force Day

When ACI Drummer Gaston Brazeur dons his kilts and sporran he drops his French-Canadian ancestry and becomes "MacBrazeur". So say his comrades in the 401 City of Westmount R.C. A. F. Reserve Squadron Pipe Band, and Gaston proceeds to beat out the rhythm of the Highlands while his friends make with the skirl of the bagpipes. ACI "MacBrazeur" joined the pipe band two years ago and since then his friends have been amazed by the occasional Scottish burr coming up in his native tongue.

This band, which has never been out of the money in its many competitions across Canada and the United States, was started in December, 1948 by its present pipe major, Flight Sergeant Jock Laurie of Westmount, Quebec. Jock is proud of his Scottish birth. Both he and Corporal Reddy Gibson were born in Glasgow, Scotland. Corporal Gibson is not going to let his son, George, forget his Highland ancestry either. He has young George with him in the band.

The majority of the bandmen are of Scottish descent, but a few, like "MacBrazeur", are of a different stock. There are three Irishmen in the lot, including a Brady and two Sheehan brothers, who seem to be quite at home with the Campbells, MacLeods, Macdonalds, and MacWheelbases.

Made up of 18 pipers and six drummers, the 401 Pipe Band arrives at the R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, fresh from honors received at the Apple Blossom Festival in Nova Scotia. They have the distinction of having won the first prize in the Gaelic Mod in St. Anne's, Cape Breton, where pipe bands from all over Eastern Canada meet each year to display their talents.

Visitors to the R.C.A.F. station on Air Force Day this year will have the opportunity of seeing this band, complete with Air Force Blue Tartan kilts and all the trappings that go with being a Scot in the R.C.A.F.

Kensington W.M.S. 60th Anniversary

The sixtieth anniversary of the W.M.S. of the Kensington Presbyterian Church was observed on Sunday evening when Miss Mary MacKenzie, Deaconess at North Tryon, was guest speaker. Mrs. Brewer Linkletter presided at the service and Mrs. Irving Jay was organist. The Scripture lesson in Paul's Epistle to the Romans, 10th chapter, was read by Mrs. Robert Stavert, after which Mrs. Alexander Hiltz offered prayer. Mrs. L. M. Callbeck was guest soloist, her selections being "Thy Will Be Done" and "The Prayer Perfect."

Mrs. John Walker gave a most interesting historical sketch of the Society from its beginning on Thursday afternoon, January 20th, 1891, when the following officers were appointed: President, Miss Barbara MacLeod; vice-president, Mrs. William MacLeod; secretary, Miss Annie Sharpe; treasurer, Miss Jane Glover. There were twenty-two members present, and this membership was increased to thirty-two before the end of the year. One of the charter members was Miss Ida Slavert, now Mrs. Robert Bowness, who still takes an active part. As this Society increased in membership a branch was formed in Kelvin on June 28, 1934, and named the Myrtle Rhoad Woman's Missionary Society in honor of Mrs. William Rhoad, whose husband was pastor at that time.

The offering was received by Mrs. Charles Adams and Mrs. Harry Heckbert and the hymns sung were "The Morning Light Is Breaking", "From Greenland's Icy Mountains", and "Jesus Shall Reign Where'er the Sun."

The guest speaker gave a message of inspiration, basing her remarks on the 12th verse of the 4th chapter of Acts: "Neither is there salvation in any other; for there is none other under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved."
