Coalition Greek regime fights to retain power

ATHENS (AP)—Last July 15 25-year-old King Constantine of Greece rejected 77-year-old Premier George Papandreu's demand for control of the armed forces and forced him to resign. Greece's worst crisis since the Communist civil war of 1947-49 followed, and for months the existence of the monarchy appeared threatened again. Papandreu's appeals brought rioting crowds into the streets of Athens and other major cities. Communists and other leftist agitators took control of the crowds. A student was killed and hundreds injured. Papandreu, who controlled 170 of the 300 seats in Parliament, challenged the young king repeatedly with the words: "The people rule, the king reigns." He demanded immediate elections, asserting, "The people's will has been violated." A year after the showdown the young king crown to secure while Papandreu wanders in a lonely political wilderness, his Centre Union party shrinking and his magic apparently gone.

Top members of the party deserted Papandreu. Finally his trusted lieutenant, Stephanopoulos, accepted the king's mandate and formed a government with other Centre Union members who had left the party fold and the support of ERE, the rightist national radical union. Papandreu is beginning to feel his age. He has drastically curtailed speaking tours although he has not abandoned his fight to retain office. His son, Andreas, is struggling to take over the leadership of the party before it disintegrates. Stephanopoulos has been

working hard to win over more Centre Union deputies. So far 46 have abandoned Papandreu. More are reported planning to go over to Stephanopoulos before Parliament reconvenes in November. Stephanopoulos now has the support of ERE's 99 deputies, the eight progressives and the 46 former Centre Unionists who constitute his Liberal party. That means 153 of the 300 seats in Parliament. In opposition are 921 Centre Unionists and 22 members of the Communist-front EDA, the united democratic left. Three independents are non-committal. A government deputy who recently died has not

New York City soon loses glamor

NEW YORK (AP)—This place is called "Fun City," but to many it is a city of growing disenchantment. For 100 years Manhattan has been one of the great meccas of mankind, and millions came here from crowded lands and far away hamlets to force their dreams. But, increasingly, it has become a place where people come merely to make enough loot so they can move away. O Henry's old Baghdad-on-the-Subway still is a metropolis of glitter and possible romance where anything can happen. The trouble is just that everything does happen. New York still has the world's tallest skyscrapers, some of the world's greatest restaurants, and loveliest women. If you have enough scratch, you can buy anything here that's for

sale, including love and justice. Among its claims to fame it doesn't like to claim: It has some of the world's dirtiest air. It has the world's noisiest subways. It has some of the world's meanest muggers, so mean that women hate to go out on its streets after dark. It probably leads the world in juvenile vandalism. It has more people on relief than most nations. It has some of the world's worst traffic jams. It has one of the world's largest sanitation departments—and certainly some of the filthiest streets this side of the cashah in Algiers. It probably has the world's most frightened civic population. People are so afraid of getting involved in trouble they

look away from a murder so they won't have to report it to the police.

It has one of the world's weirdest tax structures—an weirder that the New York stock exchange is threatening to move to New Jersey to avoid higher taxes, so weird that smuggling in tax-free cigarettes by "butterleggers" has become a major industry. And when it comes to strikes and work stoppages, New York tops them all.

It is beginning to look as if the biggest fraud ever perpetrated on the white man in this hemisphere was the deal by which the cunning natives palmed off Manhattan to the Dutch—for \$24 and a keg of stomach tonic.

Guard lures the tourists

KINGSTON, Ont. (CP)—There has been peace with the United States since 1814 and speechmakers point with pride to nearly 4,000 miles of unfortified border.

But there is one military garrison still watching out on the Canadian frontier—the Fort Henry Guard here.

From May to September, about 80 young men in the scarlet uniforms of 1867 are on daily display in the strongpoint built 150 years ago to keep the Yankees out. Only their major mission now is to attract the foreigner, and his tourist dollars.

The Fort Henry Guard is selected from university students, with a few youths from high schools. It used to be dominated by Queen's University of Kingston, but the guard commander now tries to bring in young men from farther afield, the Maritimes and Western Canada and even the United States.

Each spring the guard is assembled and training begins in April, before the tourists arrive. The drills and battle tactics of 1867 are learned and newcomers are measured for their uniforms.

Then the guard goes on display. When not on parade, the guardsmen act as guides to the fort and its museum.
