The only hope for Canada lies in the English plan of turning out one Government after another until both parties come to realize that the country is not to be considered simply a victim for the party that happens to be in power. While Sir John Macdonald lived there were enough hero worshippers in the country to keep him strong for votes in spite of mistakes. There is no Sir John Macdonald in Canadian politics today, and it is doubtful if any man can ever hope to have the sway he had. Sir John Macdonald ruled his Cabinet and his party generally, but this strength came only after many years of power. Instead of the Premier ruling, now it has become the fashion for the Premier to sit as a figure head at his Council meetings and to bow humbly to the dictum of any Minister, no matter how corrupt a scheme he may have.

There is no one man power for the Ministers to fear. That's why Mr. Tarte and Mr. Blair and Mr. Sifton can pledge the country's resources to seeming contractors and trazen partisans without going through the formality of first having a Cabinet meeting. The Conservatives may rest assured when it comes their turn for power, the only way will be made to make up the Cabinet of the best men to be found in the whole country, and then to strike out a patriotic course that will command respect. No man knows better than Sir Charles Tupper that only on this plan could a Government endure. We do not know, nor can we think, of any independent man or newspaper now finding fault with the riot of the Liberal Government, that will not be equally staunch in fighting the Conservatives on the same lines. The time has gone by when either the Conservatives or Liberals can come into power and defy public opinion and public decency. The Liberals seem to think that the Liberals will remain in power whatever their faults may be, and this feeling may account for the plundering that goes on with impunity. Yes, the Star will feel it to be its duty and its privilege to watch the Conservatives in power as it did when they were in power before. The men who can make mischief for the country are the men who happen for the time being to have the reins of Government, and both sides need watching.—Ed. Star.

THE PLEBISCITE CAMPAIGN.

Dr. Carman's Arraignment of the Liquor Traffic.

Dr. Carman, in the course of his able address to the Methodist General Conference said:

"The liquor traffic is the foe of every interest of humanity and of every claim of the righteous God. It is the despoiler of reason and intelligence, of virtue and piety, of social order, domestic comfort and civil prosperity and peace. It is the utter conscienceless plunderer of the wealth of the family and the nation. And yet it boasts that it pays seven millions of dollars into the Canadian revenue. Is the Government guiltless? Are the people guiltless? Are we human? Are we honorable? Are we true? Certainly we are not. Our revenue is raised our revenue out of plunder, out of robbery, out of ignorance and insanity; seeking poverty and disease; a revenue out of fallen men and women, desolated homes and the tears of wives and the mothers, and the wail of the orphan. There is nothing in this about this; there is nothing manly, nothing noble. Our statesmen should show themselves worthy of the name in this matter as did Gladstone, a Tilley, a Galt or should leave the government to men who can carry it on without debauching the people into drunkards and sots. Alas! alas! for us as a people, if we force our Government into partnership with distillers and saloonkeepers to secure public funds. How, then, about the ballot-box? Canada, body and soul schools churches and homes, agriculture commerce manufactures and art sold at Bacchus and his minions for \$7,000,000 per year! In that day it will be a proud thing to be a Canadian. God and true religion are at war with the liquor traffic. The free, moral and responsible personality is at war with the liquor traffic. The genuine church of Jesus Christ is at war with the liquor traffic. The home is at war with the liquor traffic. Pure government and the State in every essential political interest is at war with the liquor traffic. In correct and incorruptible society is at war with the liquor traffic. The brotherhood of universal humanity on all continents and seas is at war with the liquor traffic. Why, then, should it be perpetuated? Why protected by Government? Why fostered by the people at large? To fatten distillers and dealers, to pander to the lusts of victims, to leave an open sluiceway to deluge the land with vice and crime and sweep many of our noblest sons and daughters into the world of an awful ruin, and to raise seven millions of revenue. When Canadians finally so determine, it will be a good time to think of leaving Canada and laboring among heathen people that make no pretensions and afford some hope. In the public test now before the country we should have our one voice throughout all our borders, that we, each of us, all of us, are decidedly in favor of a Dominion law prohibiting the importation, manufacture and sale of in exciting drinks for beverage purposes.

The Northwest Indian and His Ways.
The Indian of the plains is a far more picturesque individual than his brother or cousin of the coast. He does not erect totem poles and has no timber for the purpose if so inclined, but he is sufficiently spectacular himself without resorting to grotesque carvings and painted wood. His saddle, with its leather hangings and wooden stirrups, is in itself a remarkable aggregation, and when set off with his goods and chattels tied in bags, rags, strings and straps, the effect is remarkable. He wears the cast off garments of his white brother in such original combinations that he looks like the personification of a second-hand store. Sometimes the adoption of a pair of gurnseys as an external covering gives him quite an athletic appearance. He wears his hair in Gertrude braids, and prefers earrings about the size of half dollar coins. A mosquito net or handkerchief is his favorite head covering, and if he assumes a hat it is as an additional and purely ornamental appendage.—Detroit Free Press.

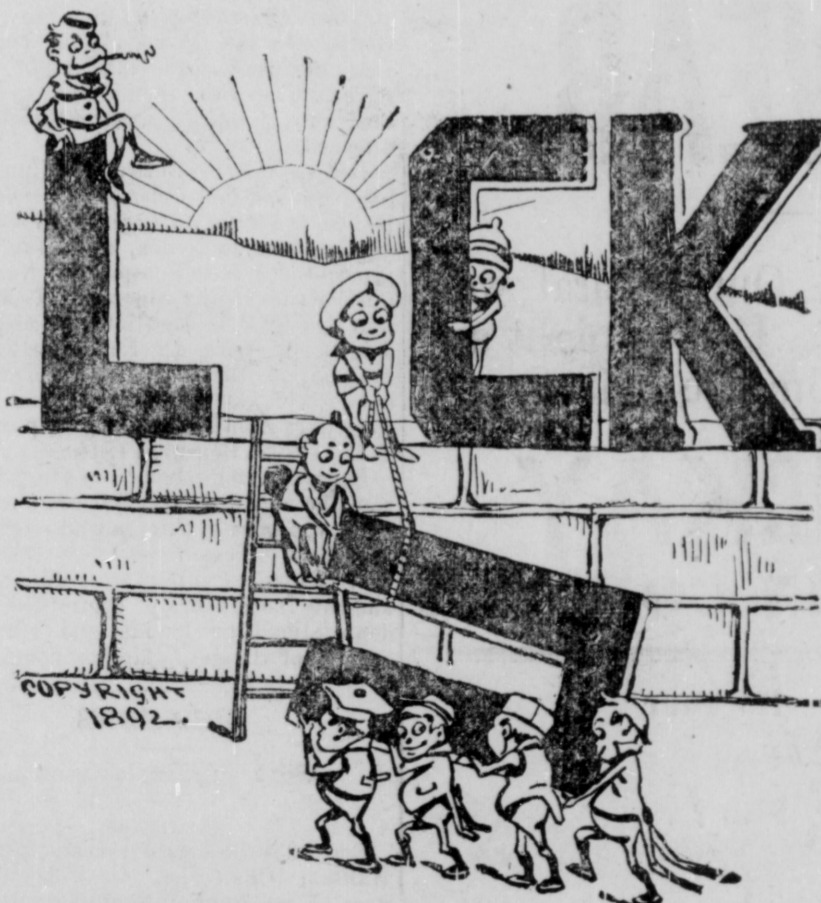

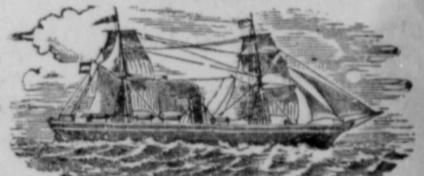
