

Randy Edwards Leaves For U.S. Home Today

Baseball coach Randy Edwards will leave today for his home in Everett, Mass. after completing a highly successful season as coach of the Charlottetown Junior and Minor League teams.

The popular coach, in his first year at the helm of the Charlottetown teams brought three Provincial Baseball Championships to the City and left a wealth of baseball knowledge with the players whom he instructed.

The departure of Edwards for the United States, will likely mean the disbanding of the Junior Abbies who won the Island Championship last week.

Edwards' decision to leave early this week was mostly based upon the fact that the Abbies would be unable to meet a mainline team in the Maritime playdowns for at least another week and possibly longer.

The New Brunswick playdowns will not be completed until next Saturday. Lewisville Cubs presently lead the Fredericton Juniors two games to none in the New Brunswick finals but the third game will not be played until next Saturday at Fredericton. This means that the Abbies would not meet the New Brunswick winner until some time during the week of September 20th.

The semi-finals of the Nova Scotia junior playdowns also have not been completed.

Edwards' last major achievement was guiding the Junior Abbies to the Island Championship by outlasting the Curran and Briggs team four games to one in a best of seven series.

A few days earlier he had brought Charlottetown Little League and Midget titles in competition with Summerside.

But his success as coach was not confined to winning championships alone. He organized a four team Little League and kept about 60 players from ages nine to twelve playing baseball during the summer months.

The progress made by those players was little short of remarkable and his work drew the praise of all those connected with baseball. He accomplished similar results with the Minor League players.

Edwards was brought here by the Abegweit Club who were assisted in the project by the Rotary Club.

There is a possibility that he may be returning next season. He enjoyed his work in Charlottetown and stated last night that he would like to return. However, there is a possibility that he may be going into business when he returns to the States and if this is so then his good-bye to sports.

Should he remain teaching, as he

did last year, he will definitely be back to continue the work which he founded so well and continue the development of the many young ball players whom he uncovered.

Dodgers Clinch N.L. Pennant With 5-2 Win Over Milwaukee Braves

Brooklyn Dodgers finally made it official during the week-end they clinched the National League pennant with a victory Saturday over the second-place Milwaukee Braves.

The flag is their second straight and the 10th in the history of the club. And the clinching date was the earliest in modern National League history.

The Dodgers took a 5-2 decision Saturday at Milwaukee, using only two of their five hits to score their five runs.

But in Sunday's game at Chicago the first game, left 3-2 to the Cubs, who now are on their longest winning streak since 1945.

It took a 10th-inning pinch grounder by Randy Jackson to decide the game.

Milwaukee's Warren Spahn became the league's second 20-game winner of the year as the Braves nipped New York Giants 2-1 on Joe Adcock's homer. The Giants beat Milwaukee 7-4 in the second game called after eight innings because of darkness.

Lefty Harvey Haddix coasted to his 18th win of the year as he held Philadelphia Phillies to five hits while St. Louis Cardinals pounded out a 17-3 victory. Haddix, who has lost eight, set the Phils down in order in six innings.

Pittsburgh Pirates split a doubleheader at Cincinnati with the Redlegs, winning the first game 5-1 and dropping the second 8-6.

New York Yankees took another step toward the American League flag with a 6-3 victory over Cleveland Indians. The win increased the Yanks' lead over Cleveland to 12 games and reduced to two the combination of Yank wins and Cleveland defeats to clinch the championship. Johnny Mize won the game with a three-run pinch homer in the eighth.

Queen Fails To Have Winner

DONCASTER, England, (CP)—Queen Elizabeth failed to accomplish Saturday what resigning British monarchs have been trying unsuccessfully since 1776—to have a winner in the historic St. Leger, oldest of Britain's flat racing classics.

The 26-year-old Queen, flushed with excitement, came to the Town Moor course here to watch her handsome three-year-old chestnut colt Aureole run in the St. Leger. He was favored in the betting five to four.

But instead of a victory to round off her triumphant Coronation year, the Queen and a record crowd of nearly 250,000 saw Aureole falter into third place.

A 10-1 shot named Premonition, owned by Brig. W. P. Wyatt and trained in the Queen's stable, romped home to win \$39,888 in the race over a mile six furlongs, 132 yards. Three lengths behind came Northern Light II, owned by Frenchman Francois Dupre.

But the Queen's reaction was a broad smile, and the crowd loved her for it.

The Queen's first minister, 78-year-old Sir Winston Churchill, a horse owner himself, was in the Royal box.

Time for the St. Leger, first run in 1776 and last of the season's racing classics, was 3:06 4-5 on a fast track.

For the Queen it was an old story of hopes misplaced. Twice before this season the high-strung Aureole had disappointed her. He ran second in the famed Epsom Derby and Ascot's King George VI and Queen Elizabeth stakes.

It was Prime Minister Churchill's first real public outing since doctors ordered him last June to take a rest. He stepped gingerly from the car, waited for Lady Churchill and then went into the Royal box with his Queen. The Churchills were observing their 40th wedding anniversary.

After seeing three runners score acting coach Des Traineur took Paul Jay out of his short stop position and dispatched him to the mound. Jay responded by striking out the first batter and getting out of the inning without any further runs scoring.
